

************************* The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in scheduled session July 10 with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding, Com-missioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) present. John Hunnicutt, legal counsel, was also present

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the minutes of the meeting of July 3 be approved. Motion

carried.

Miscellaneous claims were Sam Hollinger met with the board and John Hunnicutt dep-uty DA. Hollinger advised that he had met with Messrs. Koning and Miles, regarding construction of the road in Panorama Terrace, and had given them information regarding specifica-tions to be followed, as well as information on culvert place-

Those present then discussed right of way acquisition for Ringering Road, and the improvement of the road. Hollinger indicated he felt it would be less expensive to construct the road on the airport property itself, than where the present roadway is located. However, he was advised as part of the terms of agreement for transfer of the airport property to the Port of St Helens, and that numerous other agencies would be involved if an attempt were made to change the location at this time. Therefore, the road would be constructed where it had been ag-

Hollinger then asked several questions relating to copies of road specifications, inventory of sign materials on hand, and what is on order. He was advised this information would be relayed to him prior to Thompson's leaving at the end of the month. Order No. 77-74 was signed, correcting Resolution No. 72-74 dated June 26, 1974, transferring appropriations within various

cation pay.
Hunnicutt then requested board authorization for subscription to Oregon Advance Sheets, at a cost of \$35 per year. Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Alhborn seconded he be allowed the subscription. Motion carried.

R.C. Warner, Chubb Pacific Indemnity Group, met with the board to discuss the county's liability insurance. Roy Nelson, clerk, met with the board to request their re-consideration of denial of salary range adjustment for the Chief Elections Deputy, as recom-mended by the Civil Service Commission. The board indicated it did not feel the recommendation as submitted was justified, because of the 5-range increase, which is abnormal, and that it had requested the Civil Service Commission to reconsider the matter.

Mrs. Carolyn Mueller, 4C representative, met with the Board to advise that because of her statements at the last meeting of the Metro 4-C program, a re-allocation of funds had been made, and that Columbia County would now be receiving its pro-portionate share of 4-C monies. She also discussed a reduction in a portion of the funding, but indicated as yet, she did not know the exact amount of the reduction, and what effect this would have on the program. She stated the 4-C had contracted for referral service, since the funds had been reduced.

At the request of Robert Toll-eshaug, Veteran Service Officer, Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded Mrs. Mae Tolleshaug be appointed as his assistant, to act

in his absence. Motion carried. Martin Lugar met with the board to present a statement for damages to a wheel on his pickup as a result of hitting a chuchhole on a road he alleged was not posted as closed. After discussion with Hunnicutt, the board agreed it would reimburse Mr. Lugar for replacement of the wheel.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded that since only one quotation was received for purchase of a new pickup for the dog control officer, Commissioner Ahlborn be authorized to purchase the pickup quoted from Jordan Motor Company at a cost of \$3,031.77, subject to its availability, and then if the pickup is not available, he be authorized to negotiate for purchase of a pick-up where he is able to locate a satisfactory unit. Motion carried.

Commissioner Minkoff moved

Rahe then discussed a letter sent from Santosh Disposal Inc. to Department of Environmental Quality, relating to dike con-struction for the Santosh Landfill proposing construction stand-ards. Rahe submitted his recommendations with regard to the diking requirements, which indicated a recommendation of a 2: :1 dike slope and a 3-foot top width, as opposed to the 1.5:1 side slope and two to three foot top width as proposed. The board indicated its concurrence with Rahe's recommendation to increase the slope ratio.

John DeFrance met with the board to present a copy of a grant application for Columbia County Burglary Prevention and Education, under the provisions of Part C of Title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, and requested the board to write a letter of intent that it would

provide the necessary \$4,260.00 matching funds in the 1975-76 fiscal year budget. After discussion, the board agreed it would write a letter of intent, but that it would be contingent upon being in compliance with local budget law at the time, and

availability of funds.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded Order No. 78-74 be signed directing the Treasurer to remit the sum of \$65.12, building permit surcharge fees for the quarter ending June 30, 1974, to the Department of Commerce, Administrator of Building Codes Division, Salem, Oregon. Motion carried.

At the request of Paul Jolma, attorney for the estate of May J Mills, Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded Jolma be advised that the county would sell a por-tion of the K-P railroad right of way which goes through affected property, for the sum of \$300.00 Motion carried.

At the request of the board, Robert Vagt, chairman of the Civil Service Commission, met with the board to discuss a letter submitted to them requesting reconsideration of some of the recommendations made at the last Civil Service meeting. He was advised of the board's dissatisfaction with some of the actions taken and or recommended, together with some of the problems encountered as a result of the action. One item mentioned was the recommendation of a Salary Range increase from 15 to 20, for the Chief Elections Deputy, which the board indicated was unprecedented with regard to the 5range recommended increase. Vagt stated he was unaware that their recommendation had been for a 5-range increase, and felt perhaps some adjustment might be made. He advised that be-cause Mrs. McMahon, the Civil Service secretary was on va-cation and would not return until July 22, and that he plans to be gone until July 29, the first possible date for a special meeting of the Civil Service Commission would be August 6. Vagt advised the board they should direct a letter to him requesting a special meeting to be held, and that if the board so desired, they could submit additional evidence to be considered at that time. Vagt indicated the problems encountered, together with the board's comments and recommendations, should be discussed

at this special meeting. Roy Nelson, clerk, met again with the board to urge them to reconsider the salary range adjustment recommended by the Civil Service Commission with regard to the Chief Elections Deputy, and requested they not wait for the next meeting, but grant the increase immediately. Nelson spoke at some length regarding the additional work-load required as a result of the last legislature, which requires the county clerk be responsible for all special district elections and school district elections, in addition to those for which he was previously responsible. Nelson indicated the Chief Elections Deputy was dissatisfied with the amount of pay she is now receiving and had indicated she would not continue in the position if she were not compensated accordingly. Nelson indicated it would require a considerable amount of time to train a new person to replace the present employee if she did ter-minate, and this could possibly result in future elections being invalid if all procedures were not

followed properly.

The board discussed with Nelson the fact that in his budget request, he had asked for, and had received, an additional Clerk-Typist II position, but that when he sent his request to Civil Service, the request was for a Clerk-Typist III position instead. Nelson stated he was not aware that a Clerk-Typist III position had been requested until a copy of the Position Description form was shown to him indicating his signature on same. He explained his request had been made prior to the May primary election and at that time he was unaware of the workload which would be required. It was noted the Position Description form was

dated June 7, 1974. Nelson then indicated if the board would grant the recommended salary range adjust-ment for Mrs. Brooks, Chief Elections Deputy, he would suggest to the Civil Service Commission that the Clerk-Typist III position be reclassified to a Clerk-Typist II position.

Nelson was advised that as a result of a discussion with Vagt, it was their intent to request a special meeting of the civil servi c e Commission w h i c h would be on August 6, and that they would take no action whatever until after that meeting. The board also indicated to Nelson that subsequent to the meeting, all action taken by the board would be retroactive to July 1st, therefore, if Mrs. Brooks were to receive any salary range adjustment, it would be effective July 1. It was noted that this would not present any problems with regard to quarterly reports necessary for the accounting department.

Nelson again requested the board not to wait for the August 6 meeting, but to act immediately on the Chief Elections Deputy position, basing his request on a letter from Robert Lucas, district attorney, in which he expressed the opinion that recommendations of the Civil Service Commission with regard to salary, be followed explicitly, regardless of the fact that ORS provides the board of Commissioners with the power of

establishing salaries. Nelson was told by the board that no further action would be taken, nor any adjustments whatever made, until after the scheduled Civil Service Com-

mission meeting on August 6. Phil Dewey, surveyor, met with the board to inquire about the transfer of duties from district attorney to county legal counsel, as outlined in a letter directed to him be Robert Lucas. He questioned who would be handling pending matters, and was told that Lucas had stated he would complete pending mat-ters himself, but all future problems would be handled by Hunn-

Keith Thompson, engineer, met with the board to report that on Friday, he would receive the final report on the traffic safety grant, and that this would be fully explained and presented to the board as its meeting on July 17th. He advised he still had one final report to submit for reimbursing funding, but this would be completed prior to his leav-

The board discussed with Thompson the supplies on hand, and what had been ordered but not received. Thompson indicated this information would be relayed to Hollinger before he leaves, together with road specifications which Hollinger had been requesting.
