Co. Building Permits Show Decline In June

Building Permits decreased in Columbia County in June 1974, compared to June 1973, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research has reported.

Building permits from 147 identical reporting centers in Oregon totalled \$83,632,372 in June 1974. This was 28.4 percent higher than the total in June 1973.

The state total in June 1974 included \$41,872,941 for 2,082 new dwelling units; \$21,601,286 for new nonresidential construction; and \$20,158,145 for additions, alterations and repairs to existing structures.

For the same month last year, the \$81,323,546 total of permits was composed of \$33,362,332 for 1,784 new dwelling units; \$38,790,003 for new nonresidential construction; and \$9,171,211 for additions, alterations, and repairs to existing structures.

Board of Trustee approval is needed to finalize the negotiations between PCC and the St. Frederic parish which have been going on for some time.

Most of the daytime classes will be basic freshmen subjects such as math, English composition, English literature, sociology, medical terminology, etc. Also planned is a class on Plup and Paper Manufacturing.

According to a spokesman for PCC, Al Koski, there are several reasons for the projected day classes. Also day classes need to be offered so that workers on different shifts, at the various mills, will be able to participate in the courses offered.

Nine of the 12 proposed classes to be offered at the new campus at St. Frederic would be credit classes which are also available at the Sylvania campus.

Koski pointed out that even though PCC is going to use the classrooms at St. Frederic it does not mean that classes will not be held in the various schools throughout the county in the evenings.

Scapoose has a number of classes scheduled for this fall, including three credit classes.

The PCC spokesman noted that more classes will probably be scheduled at the new campus if the program is successful next year. "There is room for many more than 12 classes," he stated.

The Columbia County Intermediate Education District will share quarters with PCC at the new St. Frederic campus if the agreement is finalized.

Boy Scouts Aid Goodwill

Good Turn Day—the annual clothing collection drive to benefit Goodwill Industries—will be held this year on Saturday, November 2.

As in the past years Scouts from the Columbia Pacific Council and members of the Rotary Club of East Portland will be among the major volunteer participants in this 24th annual Good Turn drive, according to Marion C. Smith, Goodwill executive director.

The major collection effort will cover Columbia, Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Yamhill, Tillamook, Clatsop, Hood River and Wasco counties in Oregon, and Clark, Klickitat and Skamania counties in Washington.

Approximately 25,000 Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts ranging in age from eight to 18 will participate in the collection drive by earlier distributing empty Good Turn bags to homes in the area, and collecting the filled ones on November 2.

Purpose of the annual collection drive is to obtain donations of reusable and repairable articles to be used in Goodwill's on-the-job training program for the physically, mentally and emotionally handicapped.

Wide Variety Of Activities At Gem Show

A variety of activities have been planned for Harmony of Gems on the weekend of August 9-11 at Pacific University, Forest Grove, Oregon, including field trips, sight seeing tours and fishing excursions.

Largest rockhound Hobby show in the Northwest, Harmony of Gems is the 34th annual convention and show of the Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies which has a membership of 165 clubs from Alaska, Canada, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Utah and North Dakota. The show is open to the public.

Members will be competing for top honors with displays of some of the finest examples of jewelry making, faceted stones, carving, gem stone cutting and mineral collections. Among the many special exhibits will be a replica of the Great Seal of the U.S.A. executed with 950 Linde Star sapphires and comprising 2000 carats in all; the largest cluster of emerald crystals ever found in the States; giant gem stones and the minerals used in the Mineral Heritage Stamps from the Smithsonian Institution and two special gold displays including the history of the Alaskan gold rush.

The Oregon Archeological Society will hold its annual show in conjunction with the gem show, assuring an exceptional exhibit of fossils and artifacts.

Tualatin Valley Gem Club, sponsoring society, will have its ever popular "rock food" table on display in a new setting.

There will be lectures and demonstrations on gem and wood identification, ch a n e l work, filigree jewelry, chains, flint working, carving, cabochon making, enameling, casting, twistcraft, stone setting, faceting and the photographing of rocks and minerals.

The latest in lapidary equipment will also be demonstrated including a specially designed saw for the pre-forming of carvings and a sphere-making machine. Selected dealers will carry a wide variety of supplies used by rockhounds and gemstone material from all parts of the world. Grand door prize will be a 1974 Datsun pickup, donated by Heinrich Datsun, GMC, of Hillsboro, Oregon. Other prizes will be rock tables and lazy susan.

Permits Show Building Up

\$4,154,439 in valuation have been added to the Columbia County tax rolls since June 30, 1973 according to a June Building Department Permit Activity Report.

Figures released by the County Building Department show that the largest increase came in the area of single family dwellings which showed a June 1974, increase of \$232,697, and a year's increase of \$2,773,041. A total of 114 permits in this category were issued for the year and 10 were issued for June.

Eight industrial permits accounted for an increase of \$663,420 which was the second highest category.

The year also saw permits issued for 218 septic tank systems valued at \$206,080. Other new construction permits saw two construction permits issued for motels and trailer courts amounting to \$68,900; three for commercial structures valued at \$14,200; two for public structures in the amount of \$26,000; 36 permits for detached garages valued at \$85,310 and 46 miscellaneous permits amounting to \$125,546.

During the month of June 1974, a total of 41 permits were issued which represents a total value of \$281,197.

The report also showed the addition of 12 mobilehomes to the tax rolls for a total of \$120,000.
