WILL R. KING.

JUDGE OF THE SUPREME COURT.

Judge King is one of Malheur County's citizens and a heavy taxpayer in the county, much of his property being in this vicinity. He has been a resident of this county since 1878, except for six years at Baker City. He is a lawyer of eminent standing. He has been on the Supreme Bench for four years and no good reason is given for replacing him by Geo. H. Burnett, who was selected by the assembly. The practice of selecting the Oregon Supreme Court on political grounds is condemned by the non-political judiciary, movement, representing the Oregon State Bar Association, which advocates the platform that "Merit and not politics should govern in the selection of judges." (Read pages 31 to 34 of pamphlet to be sent voters by Secretary of State.)

In speaking of Judge King's qualifications, the Oregon Daily Journal of Portland, a leading newspaper of the State, in its issue of October 10th, said:

"One of the ablest jurists in Oregon is Supreme Justice Will R. King. He is known throughout the State as an independent thinker of profound powers of analysis. He has the reputation among laymen as well as among the members of the bar of applying a great deal of common sense as well as broad intelligence in construing the law. Judge King is opposed by Judge Geo. H. Burnett, who was nominated by the assembly, who accepted the nomination from the assembly and who stands on the platform of the assembly."

The above quotation expresses the general sentiment throughout the state with reference to Judge King's qualifications.

Voters, it is for you to say whether merit or politics shall rule in the selection of our judges, and what is more, do you want to replace one of your own citizens who has grown up among you, by a Western Oregon man who is unfamiliar with Eastern Oregon?
