DAIRYMEN KICK.

Isn't it just perfectly awful! Senator Heyburn, of Idaho, is after the dirty dairy products, and is about to get a federal law passed by congress, protecting the public against unsanitary dairy products.

Forthwith the great dairy-men's association of Idaho has raised the cry that such a law will ruin their business.

We are no lover of Heyburn, but we are with him on this proposition, soul, body and breeches; for if the enforcement of absolute cleanliness will ruin the dairy business in Idaho, or any other state, it deserves to be ruined.

The pure food law now on our statutes, and which Senator Heyburn succeeded in forcing through the U. S. senate by bulldog grit and sticktoitiveness, has been the means of reducing the death rate in the United States very perceptibly, and we believe it is the duty of every good citizen to back him against all those interests and associations, that fear the effects of honesty and cleanliness upon their "business."

Give us greater purity in our foodstuff, and less business, if need be.

Every Nyssa farmer should prepare an exhibit in some line of his products, for the Malheur County Fair.

That trainload of western governors, it is proposed to send east this fall, will sure attract attention as an exhibit. Wonder if they will be classed with the vegetable, or livestock exhibit?

Senator Borah, of Idaho, has at last succeeded in securing the passage of his direct election measure by the senate, looking to the election of U. S. senators by a direct vote of the people.

Any old town can build a paper railroad, but it is only a few of the best of us that have the real thing on exhibition. If you want to see actual railroad construction in progress, come to Nyssa.

The petitions for another local option election across the river in Canyon county, Idaho, are being generously signed, and it is reported that another election is sure to be held. This will test the matter as to how well the people are satisfied with "dry" conditions.

New Oregon School Laws

Are being published, 16,000 copies, which will be ready for distribution before long. The legislature ordered the disposition as follows, says County Superintendent Milligan:

One copy to each district school officer in the state, and one to each member of the legislature.

Five copies to each county school superintendent in the state.
Five copies to each chartered educational institution in the state.

The remainder to be distributed at the discretion of the Sup't of Public Instruction.

Where does the teacher come in? School law is one of the subjects on which he is required to write in the examinations, but there is no overt provision made whereby the teacher can procure a copy! Once, several years ago, the legislature provided for the sale of 5,000 copies at 25 cents apiece; and the teachers would be glad to get them at that price. There were 2,222 districts reported in the year 1908. There are probably 2,250 now. After these are supplied, 4 copies to each district, and five copies to the county superintendents the members of the legislature, and chartered institutions, there will be over 6,000 copies left, possibly; and probably the teaches can be supplied from this source. We'll try to find out, and let you know.

Two notable conventions were held in this state within the past fortnight, the Oregon bankers and the Oregon postmasters. The postmasters went on record for an extension of the postal savings system, while the bankers didn't. It is safe to say that if the latter had gone on record at all on the subject, it would have been for the extinction, rather than the extension, of that system.

The high price for wool at the wool sales in Ontario this week was 16c for fine wool. The local papers all over the country are jubilant over the increase in prices being paid for this year's wool clip. Yet the president of the national woolgrowers' association is out with a calamity howl, saying tariff tinkering has killed the wool industry all over the country. It looks to a man up a tree like a little more "tinkering" would be a good thing, if the price of wool continues to be affected by it as it has been so far.

School Ma'am Drops Her Note Book

A Malheur county school ma'am lost her note book while attending the special preparatory review course, conducted by Prof. R. G. White in Nyssa this week, and it was picked up by one of Nyssa's citizens.
