DAILY DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

OLD IDEAS ON DIET FOR ATHLETES NOW DISCARDED.

"The question of diet is of first importance in the training of athletes," says the Medical Record, "and concerning this matter, widely divergent views have been expressed by various authorities. It is freely allowed that the opinions of old-time dictators on the best means of feeding those in training for the exertion of severe physical effort have been for the most part overturned. The diet in vogue in such cases 40 or 50 years ago would not meet with favor in these days. . . . There are many formidable athletes, nowadays, like Eustace Miles, one of the best tennis players who has ever lived, who are rigid vegetarians." Reference has frequently been made in these hints to cases in which new records have been made by athletes who attribute their success largely to a simple diet, excluding flesh meat. It may be safely laid down as an established rule that the greater the variety and excess of food the greater the draft upon vitality for its digestion and elimination, and therefore the less left for work, physical or mental. Great works of literature and of arts generally have much more frequently come from the garret than the banquet hall.
