Dead Horse with Full Rigging.

Parties about a mile above Nyssa found a dead horse floating in Snake river Monday, with its saddle and bridle on.

They anchored the carcass long enough to remove the rig. The horse was brown, but no brand or mark was discovered. The saddle is almost new and bears the name "W. J. Bozarth, Douglas, Wyoming." A cattle whip and a man's glove were tied to the saddle.

As soon as the matter was reported here, officer W. W. Smith began investigations, with the result that the following information was secured:

Two boys about fifteen years old, but whose names could not be learned, had crossed some cattle over to an island in Snake river Sunday, and when attempting to swim over on their horses, one of the animals sank and was not seen again. The rider disengaged himself from the sinking horse and swam ashore on the Idaho side. The other rider slipped back of his saddle, caught his horse by the tail and made the crossing all right. It was agreed by calling across the stream that they should meet at Ontario, the one on foot to walk over to Apple Valley and catch the next train.

Mr. Smith phoned to intercept the boys with the information that their rig had been saved, but the officers have made no report from down the line.

Contract Signed for Pumping Plant.

C. E. Peck was in from Kingman Colony Tuesday, and informs us that the contract has been signed with Jas. A. Green & Co. of Chicago, for the construction of the Kingman pumping system complete.

LA FOLLETTE BILL
