LABOR DAY.

Labor Day proclamation says,

"The rapid progress of the
world's advancement is indicated
by the increasing homage
paid to labor," etc.

It occurs to us that labor
would benefit more if paid
more money and less "homage."
The average laboring man is
long on "homage" and short on
cash. "Homage" don't pay the
grocery bill, and we have yet to
hear of a labor organization going
out on strike for more "hom-
age."

The average statesmen of the
present generation is too prone
to deal in these generalities,
about the "dignity of labor,"
and "paying homage to labor,"
when an actual condition is
to meet, which requires dollars
and cents, and not generalities.

What the working man needs,
and must have, is a sufficient
increase in wages to meet the
increased price of living, bro't
about by class legislation, per-
mitting combinations of wealth
to corner foodstuffs and sell
them out at exorbitant prices,
and at the same time dictate
to the working man what he shall
receive as wages.

Ninety-five per cent of the voters
of the U. S. earn their living by
some sort of labor, and any time
this great giant of labor takes in-
to his head to conduct the govern-
ment, after his own ideas, he is
going to do it, no matter how crude
these ideas may be.

Labor is willing for the other
fellow to run the government, as
long as he gives the workingman
any sort of fair play, but the greed-
iness of humanity, and the desire
of the few to corner all the money
of the earth, has brought about a
condition of unrest among the
workers of late years, that prom-
ises a revolution of conditions
within the next few years.

If a sufficient number of the
workers can be satisfied with
conditions, the rest can perhaps be

tions to preserve the certificate from
destruction. He delivers it enclosed
in a little tin tube."

Veteran Painter Still at Work.

B. W. Leader, R. A. England's fa-
mous painter of landscapes, has, at the
age of eighty, put the finishing touches
to three pictures by which he will be
represented this year at the Academy.
His "February Fill Dyke" is one of his
best-known works. Leader's father
was a painter of some merit, and the
son inherited a strong artistic nature.
During his early life he was, by force
of financial circumstances, compelled
to paint the kind of pictures the public
liked. "Many's the time," he states,
"I have wished I could destroy a num-
ber of those early pot-boilers." His
first picture was exhibited at the
Royal Academy about sixty years ago.
He has many pleasant memories of
Constable and Millais. As may be ex-
pected, Mr. Leader is a fierce oppo-
nent of the Post-Impressionists.
