ballasted tops where the ties are laid the same as on the land; a practically fireproof method, as well as being more practical in upkeep.

Main line construction has been adhered to throughout, a positive certainty that the O. S. L. intends its heavy business at a later date to take the river route from Buhl to Nyssa.

From Nyssa to Homedale, where grading ceased a year since, 100,000 acres of fine lands are spread out alongside the track, all in private ownership and varying degrees of improvement.

The trade of this territory, five miles wide by 30 miles long, will be immensely increased by construction of the railroad and towns will spring up where sidings have been placed.

The Bend at present has nearly 7000 acres of lands under ditches, the Kingman Colony 3000, with a proportionate population, warranting daily train service to Homedale, where the 30,000 acres of the Gem district still beyond to the south and east is to receive water this year. An immense development of this virgin empire is predicted with railroad building keeping steadily in front.
