NEW YORKERS MAY WATER BLACK CANYON

Offer to Irrigate District for Half of Land--Settlers Evidently Prefer Waiting.

Homesteaders of the Black Canyon project are interested at the present time over the renewed efforts of New York capitalists to take up the development of the district. A representative has been at Caldwell the past two weeks interviewing various homesteaders and the directors relative to the same proposition as that proposed by them a year ago. At that time the same man was there for the New York people and proposed that the Black Canyon rights on the Payette river and at Payette lakes be turned to them and that the homesteaders be negotiated to consign half their lands, for which the company would contract to supply water to the homesteaders for the remaining half.

The representative claims a colonization scheme by which he would be enabled to place families on all the land secured from the homesteaders.

The directors of the district are not over enthusiastic for the scheme and prefer now to await the movement proposed last year, in which homesteaders expressed a decided preference for the government to take up the work. Senator Borah has introduced a bill for \$30,000,000 additional funds for the reclamation fund and out of this it is hoped that funds will be available for the Black Canyon.—Nampa Leader-Herald.
