CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight, 'twenty-four ounces, full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' and ever roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon, and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."

Bit of Old Printing Found.

Recently Prof. P. D. Sherman, of the English department of Oberlin college, Oberlin, Ohio, in looking over an edition of Augustinian sermons printed in 1496, discovered on the inside of one of the oak boards what looked like a printed vellum sheet.

By carefully scraping away the paper fly leaf and soaking off the vellum a folio leaf 12 by 16 inches, printed in two fonts, with the paragraph marks, headings and capitals in red was recovered.

Unable to identify the sheet Prof. Sherman sent it to the British museum. Word has just been received from Alfred W. Pollard, expert in the department of printed books in that institution, that the fragment is folio 40 of the Clementine constitution, done by Peter Schaefer at Mayence in 1467, and dates back to within one decade of the Gutenberg Bible.—Rosary Magazine.

Old Connecticut Elm Destroyed.

The ancient elm tree, an old landmark that has stood on the banks of Middle Cove Bay for over two hundred years, was blown down during the storm of Monday and fell into the cove. All that is left of it are the large roots, sticking up to show where the old tree was once located.

After a heavy gale several years ago one large limb fell to the ground and from it were taken Indian arrow heads of perfect shape. They were probably shot or deposited there by Indians years ago, who used this locality for a camping ground. The height of the tree was about one hundred feet and its branches spread out about the same distance. The body of the tree measured some fifteen feet around. Red squirrels had made their home in it for years.—Essex correspondence Hartford Courant.

Chocolate at First Dishes.

Chocolate was regarded as an invention of the devil by a considerable class in England during the seventeenth century. A formidable treatise was written in order to denounce the use of the beverage by monks. The treatise appeared in 1634, but the monks saw to it by destroying every copy that came their way, that its circulation was small and brief. Chocolate houses succeeded coffee houses in London as centers of a supposed greater refinement, although Roger North describes them as centers for the benefit of "racks and cillies of quality, where gaming is added to all the rest," and where plots against the state were hatched by idle fellows.

Women Not Warmly Clad.

Doctors have recently testified with rather an unusual degree of unanimity, that women in these days do not dress warmly enough; that neurasthenia is often the result of wearing clothing of insufficient thickness. It is not poverty, they say, but style, that causes the difficulty. Women cannot imitate the sylph-like maiden of the fashion plate and wear heavy undergarments and thick dresses. Fashion, with beautiful disregard to the changing seasons, demands gauzy stockings, low shoes, décolleté gowns and short sleeves. The result is too often pneumonia or an exhaustion of vitality and nerve force in the effort to keep warm.—Success Magazine.

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NOT MUCH CHANCE FOR A RICH MAN SAYS THIS WRITER

Impossible for Camel to Get Through Eye of Needle or for Rich Man to Enter the Pearly Gates.

Nyssa, June 30.—Editor Journal.—"John Smith" in last week's issue of the Journal, in commenting on my article regarding the camel and the needle's eye, did not apparently thoroughly understand my position. My contention that Christ could not have meant the little gate in the wall of Jerusalem was based solely upon the assumption that it was possible for a camel to pass through that gate. This belief on my part was due to instruction received at Sunday school. An examination of the authorities, however, shows that they are practically unanimous in the belief that such a feat on the part of the camel was an impossibility. This theory satisfactorily explains the astonishment of the disciples at Christ's words, and if its correctness is granted I will readily admit that the gate was as likely to have been what Christ meant by the needle's eye as anything else, but in that event I will have to forget all my Sunday school instruction on that subject. It might, of course, be contended that Christ really meant what he said in this connection, but in view of the frequency with which theologians find it necessary to reconstruct Christ's statements this would probably be a rash assumption. It is a matter of regret that your correspondent, who is a Bible scholar, did not illuminate the subject by expressing an opinion of his own and giving reasons therefor.

I agree with Wheedon that the "salvation of a rich man is as much a miracle as the putting of a camel through the needle's eye." In fact, will go a step farther and accept Christ's statement that it is EASIER for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to be saved. Christ's position in this matter appeals more strongly to my sense of the fitness of things than does Mr. Wheedon's.

DEVELOPMENT OF PROPOSED ROAD NOW UP TO BOISE

San Francisco Has Done Her Share and Boise Is Now Expected to Get Busy.

Col. E. R. Place, who is promoting the proposed Boise-Winnetuca railroad, arrived in Boise Monday, and gave the Capital News the following interview regarding the prospects for the new line:

"Everything is progressing nicely," declared the colonel this morning, "and all preliminary arrangements at the other end of the line have progressed just as we have anticipated. In fact, everything up to the present time is up to the people of Boise. On their behalf certain representations were made to the people of San Francisco who have interested themselves in the building of this road and to other influences which are back of the project. It is now up to the people of Boise to make good on these representations. The other people have so far done all that they promised to do and all they have been expected to do and so soon as the Boise end is put into shape, which we shall expect to do as soon as possible now, all will have been done that can be done until actual construction work is begun."

At the meeting of the stockholders held in Winnemucca some ten days ago directors for the road, the Winnemucca Northern, were elected, a very fair proportion of the directorate being allotted to Boise, some of the leading financial men of the city being selected to represent this section.

Colonel Place is more than pleased at the reception given the project by business men of California and at the enthusiasm displayed there where all the commercial organizations of the San Francisco bay country and Sacramento have placed the stamp of their approval upon this road.

OWYHEE POWER SITE RESTORED

Washington.—Secretary of the Interior Lane has recommended and the president has ordered restored to entry 2500 acres on the Owyhee river held unsuited for the conservation of water power, also modification of an order withdrawing 1291 acres known as power site No. 77 on the Snake river in Oregon and Idaho.
