CAUTION!

CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' sixteen ounces, full weight,' 'twenty-four ounces, full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' and ever roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."

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HUERTA REGIME IS FATED TO REPEAT MADERO HISTORY

Washington Learns Provisional Government Is Doomed and Overthrow Hourly Expected at Capital.

Washington. — The government of Provisional President Huerta of Mexico is doomed and his overthrow is expected hourly.

This information, furnished from an authoritative source, is in the hands of the United States government today, and this, it was stated by a person in authority, is the reason the Wilson administration has not recognized the present Mexican government. It could not be learned whether the information was received from American consuls in Mexico or from private sources. Unconfirmed reports, circulated today, were to the effect that American Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson has been summoned to Washington to explain quotations in which, it is alleged, he criticized the Wilson administration because of its failure to recognize Huerta.

United States Ambassador Wilson will arrive here from Mexico City Thursday or Friday. It is not expected here that he will return to the Mexican capital.

Moses Wise on Sanitation.

A collection of facts have been gathered by a writer in Harper's Weekly going to prove that the sanitary laws of Moses were not only on a line with modern rules of hygiene, but in some cases in advance of them. The Jew, thousands of years before Christ, settling in a semi-tropical country, was forbidden to eat pork or shellfish, and milk was designated as a source of contagion. In the Talmud a method of slaughtering animals was prescribed which is acknowledged in our markets as the most sanitary. Five thousand years before Kock gave to the world the results of his researches in bacteriology the Mosaic law pointed out the danger to man from tuberculosis in cattle, but did not forbid infected poultry as food. It was only a few years ago that German specialists discovered that fowl tuberculosis was harmless to man. The Mosaic law also enforced the isolation of patients with contagious diseases and the burial of the dead outside the cities. These hints the Gentile world did not fully accept until a century or two ago. The wise lawgiver prescribed not only fasting at certain periods of the year, but the removal of whole families in summer out to camps, where for a time they could live close to nature. Many of the laws of Moses were prescriptions intended for the health of both mind and body.

Irrigation Work Humming.

A large number of teams are at work on the big ditch and some of it is completed and the work is rushing as fast as possible. The large fact is that the irrigation project will be transferred to this work. Dept. Sheriff Wroten, upon advice from Canyon county, Idaho, arrested Irwin Price at the Carleton Fretwell ranch on the Owyhee river for cattle stealing. This was a great surprise to everyone as Mr. Price has heretofore borne an excellent reputation in this locality. He has been an honest, sober and industrious young man and was looked upon as a model citizen.

It seems he visited acquaintances at or near Middleton, Idaho, last spring and by some unknown influence left there driving a milch cow that belonged to another party. Just how this came about will probably come out in the preliminary examination or trial. The account given by Price of how he came in possession of the cow sounds "fishy." We hope he can explain the matter satisfactorily to parties interested and the party or parties who worked up the job can be apprehended, as he may have been used as a tool by others. The officers came in Monday and took him to Caldwell.—Jordan Valley Express.

NOT BOUND TO SUPPORT TARIFF BILL

Washington. — Senator Chamberlain of Oregon announced today that he does not feel himself bound to support the tariff bill in the form in which it has been reported by the senate finance committee.

"I want it understood that as a senator I am absolutely free to support what is right in this matter, but I am not bound to support this or any other measure. What I want is truth and light," said Chamberlain. Chamberlain's declaration leaves the democrats with only 46 votes absolutely certain for the bill, but with Vice President Marshall's deciding vote this will be sufficient to carry through the administration's program.

Arrested for Wife Desertion

On July 8, John A. Stout and Lola Alls of Ontario were married at Ontario. A few few days after he left his bride, and on her complaint a warrant was issued for his arrest on the ground of failing to support his wife and deserting her. He was apprehended at Starbuck, Wash., and brought back here by Deputy Sheriff Ben Brown, and a preliminary hearing was conducted by District Attorney Brooke before Recorder Grauel yesterday, resulting in Stout being placed under \$500 bonds to await action of the grand jury, and not being able to furnish the bond, he was remanded to the custody of the sheriff.—Ontario Democrat.

SALES OF THE TELEPHONE

Exploitation in England Seemed Impossible Until Queen Victoria Became Interested.

The United States has eight telephones for every hundred of population, while no other country has half as many. Following the establishment on a solid basis of the American telephone system work for European exploitation was early begun. The results were hardly encouraging. Five-eighths of the rights were purchased for a few cents. After the National Magazine was published in London four months ago, no one could find any one who would pay a shilling in the telephone. As a British review said of it: "The telephone is little better than a toy in the English, but is inferior to the well established system of air."

The history was won at last by Kate Field, who sang "Kathleen Mavourneen" over the telephone in Queen Victoria. The queen was delighted, asked Bell if she might buy two telephones, and it was not long before all England was interested. An exchange with ten wires was opened in London, and in April, 1879, Theodore Vall sent an order to the factory in Boston in his terse, characteristic way: "Please make 100 hand telephones for export trade as early as possible."

TO KEEP RAZORS IN SH

For the purpose of preventing the rusting of small instruments, the Lancet recommends that equal parts of carbolic acid and oil be mixed and the blades of razors be placed in it. This is a good method of preserving the blades of razors in the case of medical officers in the tropics. The brightness of the steel, the heat and the climate may be maintained. For large instruments and blades lined may be recommended. Wipe the metal with a cloth, then in the oil, and let it dry.
