Sunny Malheur is outdoing  
herself the last few days, but  
the rays of Old Sol bring only  
pleasant reveries to the Snake  
valley rancher as he eats water-  
melon in the shade of the old  
apple tree and watches the alfalfa grow.

Seven cotton mills at Fall  
River, Mass., employing 5000  
persons, have just resumed  
operations. And this is just  
the time that, according to pre-  
dictions made by the standpat-  
ter, we should be subsisting on  
tree soup and expectations of  
better times after the G. P.  
had been returned to power.

Colonel Roosevelt has re-  
turned to Oyster Bay from a so-  
journ among the Arizona In-  
dians. Few people knew that  
he had forsaken the beaten  
paths of civilization and his re-  
turn was heralded by only brief  
mention in the papers. Is the  
colonel's notoriety waning or is  
it that he is only temporarily  
overshadowed by the popularity  
of President Wilson?

Among other advantages pos-  
sessed by land under the Owy-  
hee district is its gentle slope  
toward the river, making cer-  
tain that a drainage system will  
never become necessary. In  
other irrigated districts much  
fertile land has been turned in-  
to swamps, necessitating in  
many instances as great an ex-  
pense for drainage as the cost  
of reclaiming the land from the  
sagebrush.

With 200 prune pickers and  
packers employed in one Nyssa  
orchard, railroad development  
work just started that will em-  
ploy 150 to 200 men more than  
a year, a municipal water sys-  
tem authorized that will give  
employment to many more and  
reports of record-breaking crops  
coming in from surrounding  
farms, even the most persistent  
knocker in Nyssa is compelled  
to go away back and sit down.

John H. Lewis, state engineer  
of Oregon, recently claimed that  
the Snake river could be made  
navigable from its mouth to  
Ontario. Yes, it might be done,  
but anyone familiar with the  
river below Huntington would  
say that it would cost as much  
money as it has cost to build  
the Panama canal. The water  
for miles is churned to foam, as  
it rushes through rocky gorges,  
with the banks on either side  
towering nearly straight up for  
over 2000 feet from the water's  
edge. With all due respect to  
Mr. Lewis, he had better guess  
again.—Nampa Record.

Registrar J. Boydell reports  
that but two ladies of Nyssa  
have so far availed themselves  
of the opportunity to register  
so that they may vote at the  
next election. This appears to  
substantiate the claims of the  
anti-suffragists that the great  
majority of women do not want  
to vote. But, anyway, now that  
they have been granted the priv-  
ilege, every lady in Nyssa should  
vote, and to do so she must reg-  
ister first. Mr. Boydell is anx-

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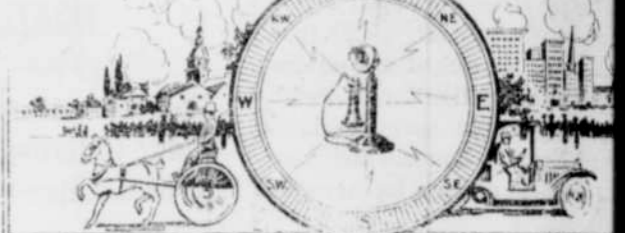
