BIG PROFITS FROM PRUNES

Grower Refuses Offer of 60
Cents per Crate Which
Would Net \$400 an Acre.

Middleton.—J. L. Phillips, the well known Middleton prune grower, estimates his prune crop this year at nine carloads from his nine-acre orchard, or a carload per acre.

Mr. Phillips was offered and refused 60 cents per crate for his entire crop of prunes. There are 1000 crates of 20 pounds each to the carload. Mr. Phillips figures each crate as costing 20 cents, which includes the picking, packing, paper, nails and the crate itself.

It is therefore seen that the offer of 60 cents per crate is equivalent to \$600 per car, or \$6000 per acre, or approximately \$5400 gross for his entire crop. Since the entire cost of a crate of prunes is 20 cents, or \$200 per car, Mr. Phillips offered amounted to a net return of \$400 per car, or \$3600 from the nine-acre orchard. Still, Mr. Phillips turned down this offer. He is getting everything in readiness for the picking and packing of his prunes and hopes to get a better price for his fruit than the offer made to him.

L. M. B. Carpenter of Notus, who owns a good 12-acre prune orchard a mile west of the Boise fair grounds, was offered \$26.00 per ton for his prunes on the trees. He estimates his crop at about 50 tons. He is still considering this offer.

To Teach Bible in School.

According to a plan adopted by the board of education at its recent meeting, bible study will hereafter be added to the curriculum of the city schools, says the Twin Falls Times. The plan was drawn up and presented to the board by the clergymen of the several churches of the city, and is one that has been tried extensively in the east, and is said to be meeting with general approval.

There will be no cost to the district in the new plan, as instruction will of course, be given free of charge.

LONGEVITY AND HEREDITY.

Insurance companies have learned that longevity is largely determined by heredity, and hence the importance of family history in this respect. One man may use intoxicants, tobacco, tea and coffee all his life and reach an advanced age, while another may avoid these and die young. Longevity of ancestors comes from the inherited results of hygienic living, usually accidental, through several generations. But patrimony can be conserved or squandered. The care free life in the open air of a man who is intemperate and eats anything may be more healthful than that of the sedentary liver who worries constantly about what to eat when he can find nothing else to worry about. To adopt good rules of living and reduce them to habits so that they require no mental strain to carry them out seems to be the wisest plan, but only the young can expect to do this without much patience and effort.

British Target Practice

Although the conditions of target practice have been made more difficult for the gunner, the number of hits has increased in the British navy. The target, towed at an unknown speed, is 30 feet high by 90 feet long, the latter dimension being less than one-fifth the length of a modern battleship. During 1910 the 10 and 12-inch guns averaged 0.7 hits per minute against 0.0 four years ago. The 9.2-inch guns for the whole fleet averaged 2.01 hits; the 7.5-inch gun made 2.61 hits as against 1.58 made by this gun four years ago.

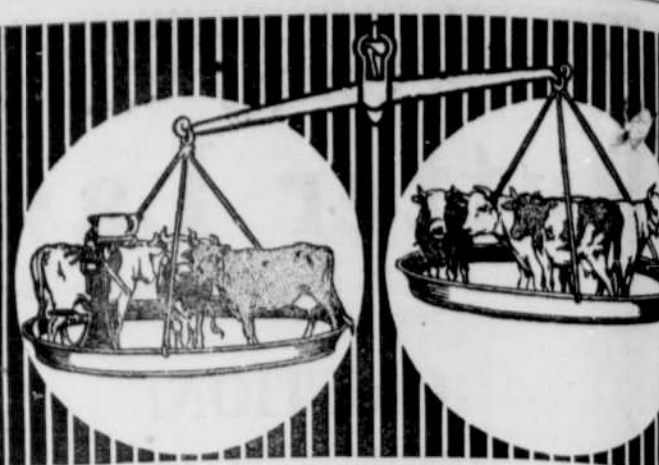
