trary to the usual belief that
the law cannot make a man

feller, the late J. P. Morgan and
the Astors and Vanderbilts are
conspicuous examples.

It is stated by officials of the
Northwestern Fruit Exchange
that over-anxiety on the part of
growers to dispose of their fruit
is costing them many thousands
of dollars, as many of them have
sold their apples at prices 25 to
50 cents below the actual mar-
ket value of the fruit. They
state this is one year when the
grower can practically name his
own price for the better grade
of apples and that a little care
and patience in marketing will
result in handsome additions to
the bank account.

Railroad companies say it will
cost \$633,000,000 to replace
wooden cars at once; which,
considering the number of lives
that would be saved, is no reason
why they shouldn't begin at
both ends and work towards the
middle.

Mr. C. C. Moore, of the United
States Department of Chemistry
has been in Oregon for two
weeks studying the adaptability
of Oregon potatoes as a raw pro-
duct for the manufacture of
starch. He has declared his
faith in the possibility of estab-
lishing factories for the manu-
facture of starch and glucose
from potatoes and has had a
meeting with Portland business
men with this end in view. It
is stated that the Pacific Northwest
at present consumes about 10,-
000 tons of starch each year,
practically all of which is ship-
ped from the East. The estab-
lishment of a starch mill in Ore-
gon would supply this annual
demand and would also provide
an outlet for surplus spuds dur-
ing seasons of low prices.

Judge Pollock has under-
taken to reverse the supreme
court on the interpretation of
the white slave law. The very
point he made in the Baker
case has been decided adverse-
ly to his contention, the su-
preme court having held that
the law plainly applies to such
cases as that of Diggs and Cam-
ineti and of Baker at Wichita.
No matter what the author of a
bill may have said, the best
guide to the intent of congress
is the plain wording of the laws
which it passes. Judge Pol-
lock's decision is a flagrant ex-
ample of judge-made law. Such
decisions impair respect for the
court and provoke that popular
clamor for recall of judges of
which Senator Root expresses
such dread.—Oregonian.

JUDGES AS SUPPLIANTS.

Former President Taft, before
the bar association at Montreal,
expresses unyielding opposition
to the selection of judges by di-
rect primaries, clings to the be-
lief that wrecked his administra-
tion and the republican party—
that the people are not to be
trusted to run their own affairs
intelligently, while political
bosses can be trusted to pick the
public officials.

The former president thinks
there is much odium connected
with candidates for judicial po-
sitions becoming "suppliants be-
fore the people." In this view
he will be joined by all political
bosses, all large corporations, all
special privilege and big busi-
ness.

There is not the least doubt
that Standard Oil would agree
with Taft; that the New Haven
road, which has corrupted the
functions of government in New
England, paying particular at-
tention to the courts, agrees
with this view; that the L. & N.
road in Kentucky and Ten-
nessee will heartily agree; while
the Southern Pacific has been

putting that theory into practice
for a generation.

The judge, who is selected at
a popular, direct primary need
not serve any master except his
conscience and justice. The
judge who has to go, hat in
hand, and supplicate before a
gang of politicians or representa-
tives of special privilege—or a
combination of both—to get his
name put on the ticket, is under
such obligations to the gang, in
event his name is slated, that he
cannot be an impartial and hon-
est judge.—Washington Times.
