A PLEA FOR CO-OPERATION

Correspondent Believes the Farmers Should Organize to Secure Better Market Conditions.

Much has been said of the wonderful opportunities for the farmer to be found in the Snake river valley. We hear many boasts of the enormous crops that are taken from the rich soil surrounding our little town—and we all glory in it all and feel thankful that we live in a land of plenty, and entertain a consistent grinch for him we term the knocker. Yet, in all candor, the most enthusiastic of us sometimes admit that just a little honest criticism can be made of some of our methods of farming and, at least, some improvements could be made in our methods without any material loss to the farmer or the community.

Any community would be proud to use our figures when mention is made of the alfalfa and wheat, oats, rye, barley, corn, and alfalfa seed in our valley, or potatoes, cantaloupes, water melons, cabbage, onions. The most famous fruit section of the whole country can be compared with our own, and we suffer nothing by the comparison. So to him that attacks the productiveness of our soil we extend a shrug of the shoulder and a snappy scowl. Can we do the same for him who says we do not realize as much from our methods in marketing our wonderful products as kind nature has made possible for us?

The movement among the ranchers to stock their farms with dairy cows and hogs and the renewed support being given to the Alfalfa Cheddar Cheese factory are ample proof that the farmer realizes the necessity of increased returns from his investment and labor on the farm. The work being done toward the establishment of this market maker for the products of the farm marks a decided step in the right direction. We believe the good to be derived from this movement means more to the farmer than can at this time be calculated.

It is claimed that the farmer cannot organize successfully. The argument most often advanced to sustain this position is that they do not stick together. We go on record with the belief that successful organizations be perfected in our community, not only to organize cheese factories, but to make even better market conditions for our fruits and garden studs.

For instance, a canning factory to take care of the fruit that does not come up to the high standard that we require for shipment to the big markets, and berries and garden stuffs. The investment necessary to launch such an enterprise would be considerable more than that required for those now undertaken, but we believe is equally as important, and the result is that Piddy was not chosen as the great American bird of fruit organization among the fruit growers to find the best possible consideration of such a project.

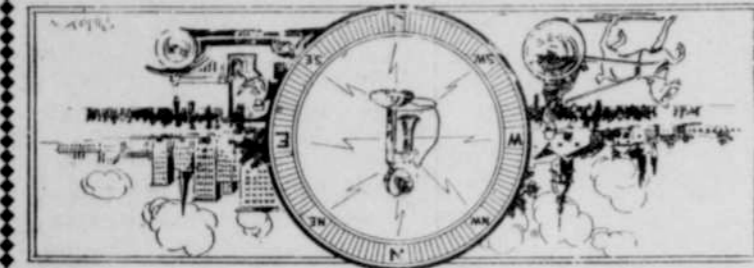
