ADRIAN AND THE BIG BEND COUNTRY

Description of a Fertile Section on the Snake River Tributary to Nyssa.

The following descriptive article of Adrian and Big Bend country is taken from the special edition of the Vale Enterprise:
Situating on the banks of the beautiful Snake river is a section of very productive land called Big Bend. Although being located east of the Snake river it does not belong to the state of Idaho, as a good many people suppose as they travel through the country, but it is one of the most productive sections of Malheur county, Oregon.
Only 12 years ago it was a vast scope of sagebrush. Now it is built up with beautiful homes, fine schools and governed by a people that are taking a great interest in the progressive welfare of their community.

These people can well feel proud of their beautiful homes, which they have built for themselves. Clearing this land of sagebrush, leveling and building irrigating ditches, is a task that can be accomplished only by those who have energy and patience. Now that they have their lands in shape they can grow anything.

The principal crops raised at present are alfalfa and clover hay, grain, corn, clover seed, potatoes, etc., all these crops yielding heavily. The estimated average yield per acre is: Seven tons of alfalfa hay, wheat, 50 bushels, oats 65, corn 75, clover seed 8 1/2, potatoes 300. Popcorn is also a good crop, yielding from 65 to 90 bushels per acre.

A good many acres of orchard are planted, such as apples, peaches and cherries. All these varieties yield well.

Hogs are being raised to a large extent and a good many of the ranchers are investing in dairy stock.

The Big Bend section is watered by two irrigation projects, one being the Riverside Irrigation District and the other the Boise-Payette project, both canals taking water from the Boise river.

This section comprises about 6600 acres of land.

There is one store in this section carrying a line of groceries, hardware, grain and implements, located at Snake River near Miller Ferry.

The O. S. L. R. R. extension from Nyssa to Homedale follows Snake river on the west side.

Just across the river from the Big Bend store they have built a siding and station named Adrian. Considerable freight is being handled there, both for the store and the farmers of this section, as well as those in Kingman Colony and Owyhee.

Two cars of potatoes were shipped this fall and had there been a stock yards there would have been a good many hogs and cattle shipped, which had to be driven to Parma, Idaho, for shipment, a distance of 12 miles, causing considerable shrinkage of the stock and also loss of time.

The railroad company now has a crew of men constructing a telegraph line along its tracks and everything looks favorable that they will commence working in the early spring extending the line out of Homedale.

Adrian will no doubt make one of the best towns on the new line with the Big Bend section lying to the south and east and the Kingman Colony and Owyhee section to the north.

All we lack is a good booster for the townsite to get outside business men interested and also a bridge across Snake river at that point, which would connect the Big Bend country with the new townsite and the railroad, thus giving the people an outlet to market their immense crops, which now must be hauled far across the state line into Idaho for shipment.

SIBERIAN ALFALFA BOON TO DRYLAND

Will Reclaim Vast Areas of Semi-Arid Land Now Unfit for Cultivation.

The Ontario department of agriculture and the farmers in Canada in general ought to be interested in South Dakota's experiments in propagating Siberian alfalfa. The legislature of that state has voted \$25,000 for carrying on the work of transplanting Russian and Siberian alfalfa, started several years ago under the direction of Prof. Hansen.

The Siberian alfalfa, which is yellow flowered, differs from the common alfalfa of this continent in being hardy enough to resist severe drouth and frost. It will thrive and spread on dry uplands where irrigation is an impossibility, and the covering of a blanket of snow is not necessary for its protection in severe winter weather. It is as good a forage as the alfalfa known to most farmers of North America, and is almost ideally suited for turning semi-arid wastes into sources of cattle fodder. The main obstacle in the way of using the wastes for stock raising has been the lack of winter forage. If the claims made for the Siberian alfalfa, which is indigenous to the bleakest parts of Northern Asia, are substantiated, a boon of priceless value to the United States and Canada has been brought to public notice.

Prof. Hansen made his first trip into Siberia in 1907, to hunt for cold and drought resisting plants for the American Northwest. The alfalfa plant was one of his finds. In Eastern and Northern Ontario are great areas where such a hardy alfalfa would mean the difference between success and failure in land occupation. It would turn to productive use districts now incapable of yielding a living for a farmer under ordinary methods. It has been successfully tried here.
