WANT AID FOR OWYHEE DISTRICT

Official Believe Government Should Water Lands of Big Project.

Washington.—The officers of the Owyhee irrigation district have appealed to Senator Chamberlain for aid in securing an appropriation for reclaiming 60,000 acres of land which they claim can be irrigated at a low cost by gravity or electric pumping developed from the Owyhee river. Complaint is made by the officials of this irrigation district that Oregon is not receiving a fair share of the appropriation for irrigation work proportionate to funds derived from sales of land in the state.

IS NAMPA TO BE RAILROAD CENTER

Newspaper of That City Reviews Situation and Finds Cause for Rejoicing.

The following from the Nampa Record is probably one of the many rumors that are circulating through these parts but it makes interesting reading all the same. Last week we were solemnly assured that the shops were just as good as located at Nyssa. The information came from reliable sources, and as Nyssa is the strategic location for the shops the news was given some credence. But it seems, however, the Nampa paper has stolen a march on us and swiped the whole shooting match. It was hardly fair to shatter our delusion so soon, as Ontario was allowed to retain the proposed location for several years, and excellent use was made of it for advertising purposes. Allowing Nyssa to have the shops only one week is rank discrimination. However, no man knows even unto this day where the real shops will be located, but it is not probable the railroad company bought 160 acres of land adjoining Nyssa for speculative purposes. But listen to the Record:

There is always something doing in the way of railway development that is of advantage to Nampa. A reliable party who talked with Short Line officials at Salt Lake a few days ago fully confirms the rumor that the V. P. railroad from Payette by way of Fruitland and New Plymouth to Emmett is to be taken over as soon as the repairs now under way on that road are completed. The repairs consist of new heavy steel rails and the strengthening of many of the bridges and culverts. The plan is to take over the road before July 1 and put on a frequent motor service with gasoline car or cars. The car would leave Nampa for Emmett over the Idaho Northern, thence down the V. P. line to Payette, thence back over the main line to Nampa, passing Ontario, Nyssa, Parma, Notus and Caldwell. Service would also be maintained going over the loop in the other direction. This Short Line loop service will make Nampa the center, as the runs will start from and end here.

Another step insuring the erection of round house and shops here in the spring was taken this week when the Short Line consolidated the mechanical department of the Boise and Nampa terminals by bringing Roundhouse Foreman M. J. Carrigan from Boise here, where he will have charge of both. T. W. Jackman, former foreman here, has been transferred to Idaho Falls. The fact that an appropriation has been made for the roundhouse and shop plant to be built here in the spring by the directors of the railroad in New York, taken with other development, makes the long looked for improvement an early certainty.

Another change that took place January 1, that has not previously been given newspaper mention, was the placing of all of the Idaho Northern tracks from Murphy to Donnelly under the jurisdiction of Roadmaster William Farrell of Glenns Ferry, thus relieving Mr. Feeny, the Nampa roadmaster, of part of his work. The new line recently taken over from Ontario to Juntura was also placed under Mr. Farrell's charge. Nampa thus becomes the center of his work and his office will be moved here, adding another Short Line official to the long list already established here.

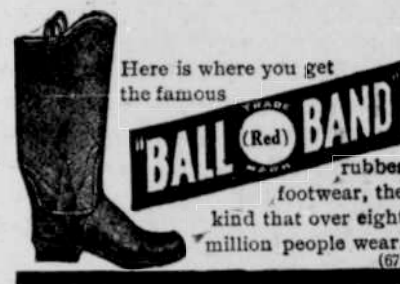
