

LUMBER YARDS CONSOLIDATE

The Empire Lumber Co., Ltd., of which H. T. Francis is local manager, has purchased the stock and good will of the Oregon-Idaho Lumber Co. of this city and the latter yard will be discontinued. G. B. Wills of the City Dray line, ably assisted by Ed Christensen, are now busily engaged in hauling the stock of the Oregon-Idaho to the yards of the Empire Company. Under the capable management of Mr. Francis, the local yard of the Empire Lumber Co. has enjoyed a profitable and steadily increasing business. The determination of the Oregon-Idaho Co. to discontinue business here was caused by the removal to Boise of ex-Mayor van Gilse, president of the company.

Suffered Loss of Arm.

Harry Myers is in Nyssa again after spending nearly seven months in hospitals at Ontario and Boise, during which time he suffered the loss of his left arm near the shoulder and narrowly escaped with his life.
