matters. They are cooperating
with the O. I. D. in endeavor-
ing to acquire government aid
for reclamation, and cementing
together the interests of the
farmers and business men.

Nyssa, Or., Feb. 12.—Editor
Journal: It seems to me that
the Nyssa Grange is not only
falling far short of its grand op-
portunity, but also of its impera-
tive duty, in not using its co-
operative strength to further, at
least in a small way, the inter-
ests of the producer and con-
sumer in this locality.

While we can only get here 10
cents per pound, live weight,
for hens, they are selling for 22
cents, net weight, in Boise; and
while we pay from 20 to 40 per
cent for many of our family
supplies, the Payette Grange
gets them, largely, at wholesale
rates? Why is this? The an-
swer is simple: Fayette cooper-
ates, and we are like Darby's
sheep, run in a gang by our-
selves.

You may visit the Grange at
almost every meeting and you
will hardly ever find a baker's
dozen present. And if you
meet any of those who are al-
most always conspicuous by their
absence and urge him to attend
the meetings, he says: "Well it
cost me a dollar and ten cents
dues last year." You remind
him that he saved more than
that amount on one ton of coal
and he will in all probability
say: "I burn sagebrush."

I hear some talk of the Grange
as "a giant asleep," but I fear
the "giant" is dying.

President Deals with Trust Question.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.
President Wilson continues to
follow the precedent he set in his
first message to congress by de-
livering the message personally
instead of sending in a written
message, like all his predecessors,
with the exception of Washington
and Adams.

The president's message was so
free from partisanship and so wise
and profound in its statesmanship
that the republicans vied with
the democrats in their deafening
applause as this message was de-
livered to congress recently. One
of the main features of the mes-
sage is the suggestion that the
antitrust laws be so amended that
a director of a manufacturing
company cannot also be a director
in a transportation company
which transports those manufac-
tured products. A second sug-
gestion is that the railroads be as-
sessed and a physical valuation
placed upon them by the inter-
state commerce commission, so
that "water" will be kept out of
the stock, which is the great evil
of the railroad question today.
The people have to pay high
enough freight rates to pay divi-
dends on the watered stock as
well as on the stock which was
purchased for money. Another
suggestion of the president is
that where the great business con-
cerns of the country violate that
the individuals who are guilty of
the wrong doings be punished and
not the business.

The message has been received
with the most enthusiastic ap-
proval throughout the country by
all classes, and the stimulating
effect has already been felt in
business, and more than one hun-
dred thousand idle employees have
been put back to work within the
last week. Pennsylvania, Illinois,
and Alabama have restored more
than fifty thousand in their iron
and steel works. The president
desires congress to make these
few amendments to the anti-trust
laws of the country, and then
pass the appropriation bills and
make an early adjournment so
that business can have a much
needed rest and encouragement.

The immigration bill is now re-
ceiving the serious attention at-
tention of congress and it is be-
lieved that this bill will pass con-
gress and become a law in a few
weeks. The bulk of the immigra-

tion which we are now receiving
from abroad is largely from the
south of Europe and they are in-
capable of becoming real Amer-
icans. It is from this section
that the notorious "Italian Black
Hand Society" emanate, and a
large percentage of them turn out
to be criminals and paupers.
Furthermore, those that actually
do work send all of their savings
back to the old country, thereby
removing a large amount of money
from this country. It is some-
thing like \$100,000,000 annually
they send back home. The immi-
gration bill provides among other
things that the immigrants must
have had enough schooling to en-
able them to read and write or
else be excluded from this coun-
try. Many of these poor immi-
grants are deluded by false ad-
vertisements of the steamship
companies into believing that this
country is a veritable paradise.
Under this bill the steamship
company that brings them over
will have to carry them back at
its own expense. It is understood
that President Wilson heartily
approves this bill and that he will
sign it when it is ready for his
signature.
