County Clerk Issues Financial Statement

The financial statement for Malheur county for the past six months, as prepared and sworn to by County Clerk John P. Houston, has been received at this office. The Journal would like to publish the statement for the benefit of its readers, but as there are only about half enough figures in the entire office to put the statement in type, to do so is an impossibility. Some day we may make enough money to buy a hatful of type and get out a real newspaper.

The statement shows the heaviest expenditures to have been the roads and highways, which totaled \$10,615.77.

Scalp bounties come next on the list, showing \$6340 to have been paid for the extermination of predatory animals.

It cost \$3937 to care for the county's poor.

The report shows that under County Clerk Houston's efficient management the office of county clerk was more than self-sustaining, the receipts from fees being \$3,123.05 and the disbursements but \$2,699.95.

All Idaho Working For Black Canyon

With the Caldwell commercial club and every state officer of Idaho, from governor on down the line, bringing their influence to bear upon the completion of the Black Canyon irrigation project, something will undoubtedly be done this season.

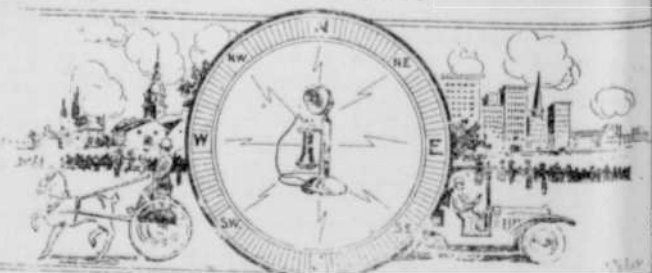
