Mr. Conant Satisfied With Snake Valley

W. T. Conant and family returned last week from a visit to their old home at Ellensburg, Wash. They report having had an enjoyable time, but were glad to get back to Nyssa.

"I was almost afraid to go back to the old place, for fear that I would want to stay there, but my fears were groundless," said Mr. Conant. "After experiencing the cold, raw winds there for a few days I wanted to get back to the sunshine of the Snake valley."

"We certainly have a great country here. Crops are much further advanced than are the crops of either Yakima or Ellensburg. Then, too, we are favored with a cheaper and more abundant water supply. In some sections of Eastern Washington farmers are paying \$4 per acre for water for land that is not as productive as that of the Nyssa country. Many of these are finding it hard to make expenses. With our cheap water, mild climate and productive soil, all we need to make this the most prosperous community in the Northwest is to develop the land until it is producing to its full capacity and raise crops for which there is a demand. Cattle, hogs and dairy products always bring a good price and can be put on the market here at a minimum cost. Intelligent efforts along those lines are sure to bring prosperity to this part of the Snake valley."

Mr. Conant's little daughter, Stella, is also an enthusiastic booster for the Nyssa country. When asked by the Journal if she would like to go back to Ellensburg to live she replied most emphatically, "I don't want to."
