INJURING "BUSINESS."

It is a pitiful commentary on the abject servility on many newspapers and politicians to the old rule of rapine and plunder that they still persist in denouncing that "business" be given a rest. To read the editorials of the former and hear the street corner wails of the latter one might almost be led to think the newspapers and public men who are demanding a square deal for the people are engaged in an attempt to bankrupt every line of business in the country. They are branded as "muck-rakers" every time they expose a graft or denounce some conspiracy of big "business" to hie from the people of the country and from our state. Their favorite cries are "Let us have a rest," "Deliver us from the agitators," or "Suppress the self-seeking politicians who would ruin business," and they are so persistent that many honest, but unthinking, people are misled by their constant howls.

The Signal dislikes to question the sincerity of any newspaper individual, but those honest efforts to the conditions of the working classes and nation, in the constantly accumulation of the dishonesty of "big business," are either direct beneficiaries of a system which permits the plundering of the masses or they are the abject tools of the rogues engaged in "high finance." The newspapers or politicians who ask that the assault on "business" be stopped asks nothing less than a submission to the gravest of frauds against the people of this country, and that honest newspapers and officials sit idly by while the very foundations of our government and undermined by the commercial and financial plunderbund. —Weiser Signal.

Every loyal Nyssanite should be at the depot on Wednesday, June 3, to welcome the Salt Lake business men's excursion. Nothing gives a stranger so favorable an impression of the town as to be greeted when he steps from the train by a large and enthusiastic crowd of local boosters of both sexes. The visitors will be here only 20 minutes and that is about the only attention we can show them during their brief stay.

An ugly looking mudhole on Main street near the depot is causing much unfavorable comment from strangers and residents as well. A well known business man insists that this should not be allowed to exist for a single day, as it gives strangers an unfavorable opinion of the town and is a source of inconvenience besides. He also suggests that Main street, from the depot to the Wilson ditch and First street from the Hotel Western to a block below Main, should be graded and saturated with crude oil. This could be done at small expense and would make a hard, smooth surface, saving the expense of sprinkling during the dry weather. He asks that the Journal call the attention of the city council to the proposed improvement, which the Journal accordingly does and hopes that favorable action will be taken in the matter.

Dr. C. J. Smith easily won the democratic nomination for governor at the primary election last Friday, again disproving the claims of the stand-patters that the people are not capable of selecting their candidates. Dr. Smith is a man of high ideals, a spotless public and private record and superior mental attainments. He carried Nyssa precinct by a more than three to one vote over his closest opponent, and the Journal hopes the same ratio will prevail at the general election this fall.

The Journal acknowledges the receipt of a pamphlet from the Oregon Agricultural College Experiment Station, James Withecombe, director. The sending out of these pamphlets may be in line with Dr. Withecombe's official duties, and again it may be a scheme of the astute doctor to get a little free advertising in furtherance of his gubernatorial aspirations.

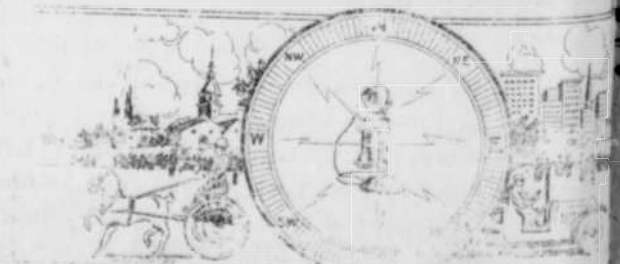
