Isaac Johnson, aged about 30 years, a Swede laborer on the J. M. Brunzell ranch at Reynolds creek, committed suicide early yesterday morning by firing a bullet through his own temples before his companion, from whom he had taken the gun, could interfere. According to the reports brought here after Coroner Schuyler of Owyhee county had made an examination, Johnson killed himself following former declarations to his friends that should he ever again get drunk he would commit suicide.—Nampa Leader-Herald.

Jerome Graham was arrested Sunday at Weiser on a charge of white slavery. He was turned over to the federal authorities. The accused is alleged to have exerted undue influence over a Weiser girl named Martha Orcutt, who accompanied Graham on a trip to Ontario, Vale, Brogan, Juntura and finally into a sheep camp. It is alleged they registered as man and wife at the hotels where they stopped. He laid himself liable to the Mann act by transporting her from Idaho to Oregon.

Five Caldwell boys, while returning from a swim in the Boise river, discovered a buckskin sack in a crevice, containing gold dust valued at \$3000. It has been taken to the Boise assay office, where it will be tested for exact valuation. It will then be divided among the boys. The fortunate lads are Dale and Elmer Kingsbury, Shilard Rogers and John Cochran, all about 14 years of age. Many old-timers in that vicinity are recalling stories of lost and buried treasures.

Faith in the local fire department and its members was demonstrated by the city council at its last meeting when they decided to reduce the insurance on the fire station from \$7500 to \$1000, says the Nampa Leader-Herald. The fire chief told the mayor the department felt insulted at having their quarters insured so high and a member of the council claimed the firemen should be fired if they couldn't protect the fire hall from fire.

Prosecuting Attorney Dillon and Sheriff Weavers succeeded this week in rounding up and arresting three young men charged with stealing cattle from stockgrowers on the Middle Fork. The report is that they were caught with ten or a dozen head of Wood's cattle in their possession. One of them named Miller confessed and his two pals, Claude Smith and Clyde Logan, were held to the district court in \$2000 bonds.—Meapows Eagle.

Lightning knocked a school girl down and killed three horses near Nampa, while reports from Baker on the west state numerous cattle were killed during the recent atmospheric disturbance, with water spouts and cloudbursts at Durkee, Vale and Homedale. Nyssa people may consider themselves fortunate that they were subjected to nothing more dangerous than a shivering spell.

Reports to the Nampa Leader-Herald indicate the recent cold snap, while unpleasant and ill-timed, did little damage to the fruit crop in that vicinity, the frost being light.

MARSHAL ON THE JOB ALMOST 12 MONTHS

Asked to outline the occurrences during his tenure of office, City Marshal H. D. Holmes gave out a statement in effect as follows:

My continuous service in office will reach the period of one year on the 17th of June. During this period I have never been out of town for more than four hours, except once when I made a trip to Vale with a prisoner. I have been to Parma once and to the Owyhee bridge twice. The balance of the time has been spent strictly within the corporate limits of Nyssa looking after my duties as marshal. The trips mentioned were made in pursuance of my duties as deputy sheriff and constable for Malheur county.

During the year to date I have made 42 arrests. These arrests were divided under my authority as marshal, deputy sheriff and constable, and do not all appear on the books of the local police magistrate. Most of these arrests were for minor offenses, only one of them being a criminal case. This one criminal was an Austrian wanted at Vale for the murder of one of his countrymen, and he is now serving a life sentence in the penitentiary for his act.

I have had occasion to disarm men who carried dangerous weapons four times. Three of these instances had to do with the same individual. The other was a Mexican, whom I was compelled to knock down several times before he would submit.

The jail record for Nyssa is light, as most of the arrests were for disorderly conduct or suspicious characters, nearly all floaters, who were turned loose in the morning after a night's incarceration and sent out of town.

At all times I have given the city a full daily service, and during the months from September 1, 1913, to April 15, 1914, I remained on duty an extra hour each day, which was allowed without any increase in salary.
