THE POWER OF LABOR

Charles S. Mellen, former president of the Northern Pacific railroad, told the Boston & Maine employees at a recent banquet given in his honor at Holyoke, Mass., that if organized labor stood steadfastly behind its leaders, they could force the world to pay the price for it.

He tendered his help, his advice, and his leadership to the cause of organized labor. "I would rather have your good will," he said, his voice ringing with conviction, "than all the salary that could be paid me by all the corporations of the world. I would like to lead you. I want to help you. The time will come when possibly I can—and when you call I shall not be found wanting."

He told the men that organized labor, if it fought its jealousies, got rid of the disloyalty within its ranks; if it exercised its power with patience and prudence and its eye on "the main chance," would in the end "right the wrong in this topsy-turvy world of ours. Labor, he said was something the world could not live without, and labor could force the world to pay the price for it.

Continuing, he spoke of the relation of labor and employers, in part as follows:

"Do you realize the power of

organized labor? Do you realize that there is only one thing that militates against its success? That one thing is impatience and disloyalty. Without labor, what is there of value in this world? Ninety per cent of all you appreciate and desire is the result of labor.

"With this tremendous power in your hands, why have you not succeeded better? Because you have been diverted from your goal by unnecessary jealousies, by disloyalty among yourselves. When you can agree on chosen representatives to speak one for all of you, then the whole world is yours and the fruits thereof. Carry that thought home with you.

"Exercise your power with patience and prudence. Remember that haste makes waste. Press forward surely and strongly, and in time you will right the wrongs in this topsy-turvy world of ours. For there are wrongs. Those who do that which the rest of the world cannot get along without. When you alone have that which others must have, you can force them to pay your price. You men have that which the world must have to move and progress. You are entitled to the price. Be firm, but prudent, and, above all, be steadfast one to the other.

"It is a fine thing to be the old man of sun an assemblage as this. I had rather have your good will than all the corporations in the world."

Business Talks With Business Men

THE small town newspaperman's troubles are multifold. He is in such close touch with the sources of his business support he loses caste from the intimacy. The majority of his readers address him by his given name, are familiar with his habits, and believe they have a more accurate gauge on his caliber than he. Thus the ideas he incorporates into his paper are often harshly criticised or lightly considered because of the personal element which the readers attach to them. They do not possess the mysterious glamor which surrounds the offerings from persons unknown except perhaps by name. Yet this is not the greatest burden he has to bear, nor the greatest obstacle he has to cope with. It is the attitude assumed by so many country merchants and business men toward their advertising that bothers him most. And it is really remarkable, the persistency with which so many, in this day of specialization and proved worth, hang to the obsolete, time worn, fruited arguments that "it doesn't pay," "we ain't got nothin' to advertise" and "people know we are here."

There are also those who are well meaning enough and sincere in their desire to "help things along" or "keep things going" who buy space in the paper year in and year out without putting anything in it excepting their name and address, who will tell you confidentially at every opportunity that "it doesn't do any good, but we got to support our home paper."

Let us tell you right here, that the day for that sort of thing is past and that those who do not realize it are relics of a bygone period, obstacles in the path of progress, and must soon drop by the wayside, or be relegated to the scrap heap. They do not belong.

It does pay to advertise in the true sense of that word, there is no argument needed to refute any assertion to the contrary; it has been proved conclusively. When the politician wants publicity he goes to the paper, when a neighboring town wants anything from the people in an adjacent community they curry favor with the paper. That is advertising and when favors are sought all are quick to recognize that it pays. To those who have nothing to advertise there is but one thing for them to do, get out of business. Let some one take their place who will carry goods that are worth advertising. Those who think everybody knows where they are, have a never passing subject for speculation in wondering why so few take advantage of this valuable knowledge. These men are generally the ones who brace their argument with the one which goes with it, that they can't afford advertising.

The well meaning people who pay for advertising that doesn't do them any good should either, take a course in a correspondence school, let some one else do their ad writing or withdraw their support and give their money to a charitable institution.

Notice is hereby given that on the 3d day of June, 1914, a petition was filed with the undersigned as Secretary of the Owyhee Irrigation District, petitioning the Board of Directors of said Owyhee Irrigation District to exclude from the said Owyhee Irrigation District the following described lands:

Lot No. Ten (10) in Section One (1); the southwest quarter (SW $\frac{1}{4}$) of the southeast quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$) of said Section One (1); the southeast quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$) of the southwest quarter of said Section One (1); the northeast quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of the northwest quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Twelve (12); Lot Two (2) of Section Eleven (11); the southwest quarter (SW $\frac{1}{4}$) of the northeast quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of said Section Eleven (11); the north half (N $\frac{1}{2}$) of the southeast quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$) of said Section Eleven (11); the east half (E $\frac{1}{2}$) of the northeast quarter (NE $\frac{1}{4}$) of said Section Eleven (11); and the west half (W $\frac{1}{2}$) of the northwest quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Twelve (12), all in Township twenty-two (22) south of Range Forty-six (46) east of the Willamette Meridian, situated in the County of Malheur, and State of Oregon, and within the boundaries of the Owyhee Irrigation District.
