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SLIPPING ONE OVER.

Under the head "Industrial News," from the publicity department of the Oregon Manufacturer, a magazine published at Portland by Col. E. Hofer & Son, the country newspapers of the state are being flooded with a "bureau service" purporting to promote the sale and use of Oregon made goods. If this were all, the Journal would be one of the most willing victims in GIVING its space to advertise the wares of Portland manufacturing concerns too poor to buy such space from the state and home press (which is as much a home industry as the manufacturer) and who beseech so pitifully for aid. But that is not all—for under the guise of development news, some of which is really worthy if properly expurgated, this "bureau" covertly, if clumsily, attacks and endeavors to ridicule, new and old legislation that in any way benefits the people—the workers, the farmers, the little taxpayers—or that is in any way aimed to control or restrict the employers of labor, the manufacturer, no matter what justice there is in the measure for others. We note with feeling that several of our exchanges, which receive no business support from the interests, and which are dependent entirely on the class of citizens suffering from these obstructionists—carelessly print all this rot each week. Evidently they are ignorant of its intent.

INSIDIOUS CHARITY.

The Boise Statesman in its rabid republicanism, flies to the rescue of Rockefeller and Carnegie, when Oily John and Canny Andy were joggled in their "selfish philanthropy" by the national educators at St. Paul recently in relation to the motive that inspired the huge endowments set aside by the former as educational endowments.

The perpetuation of the names of Rockefeller and Carnegie as belonging to men who were great benefactors of the race, by attaching them to necessary institutions, does not instill proper gratitude in the breasts of the great mass of American people, when they forcibly accept this magnanimous charity made possible by their personal losses. The constant contemplation of a private name over the doors of public institutions, is not conducive of humble appreciation on the part of seekers for knowledge or health, when their citizenship rights in a nation, marvelously wealthy, should entitle them to it without the innuendo of charity from anyone.

The trouble with those "high-brows" at St. Paul was: They were expressing the growing sentiment of the country—that no charity from freebooter, past or present, is needed or desired in conducting the education of the young; that the people are capable of handling their own affairs without restrictions imposed

by gratuities offered as a balm for past injuries.

Is it true, as the Statesman so loyally claims, that these predatory gentlemen have no wish to instill subtle, false economic principles into the budding American mind, or is it true that these aged men, feeling the rebuke of the world upon them, are clinging to the futile hope that succeeding generations may be trained to admire such achievements as theirs; that the names now used as synonyms for greed and rapacity, never spoken without contempt, may some day be voiced in tones of praise, as representative of men who were benefactors of the people they really debauched.
