WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

July 1 the local railroad known
as the Payette Valley railroad was
taken over by the Oregon Short
Line and is now being operated
branch line of that system. That
the line will be improved by re-
surfacing and laying of heavier
steel in the very near future is the
general report. One of the fea-
tures of the taking over of the road
is the fact that on July 21 the
Oregon Short Line will issue
tariffs giving to all stations on the
Payette Valley railroad main line
fruit rates. This means a saving
to the fruit growers of an average
of \$20 per car on every car of fruit
hauled by the road and in the
aggregate represents a large sum
of money.—Payette Enterprise.

Nampa seems to be a Mecca for
youthful criminals, three boys, all
under 21, having been sentenced
to terms in the Idaho state peni-
tentiary last week. Two of the
three were local boys, Frank Ham-
ilton and Jonathan Rutledge, com-
ing from good families. They
broke into a work car and stole a
small revolver and 17 bottles of
beer. The other boy, Frank Allen,
was given one to 16 years for
breaking into three business es-
tablishments from which he ob-
tained a total of \$4.90.

About 11 o'clock last night fire
broke out in the middle room of
the building occupied by the El
Queno cigar factory on Thirteenth
avenue, between Front and First
streets. The building, upon which
no insurance was carried, was dam-
aged but not destroyed. The con-
tents, mostly made up of tobaccos
were destroyed by fire and water
with a loss which is estimated at
approximately \$1500.—Leader-
Herald.

The first discussion of plans for
the Malheur county fair of 1914
was held by the fair directors
Tuesday evening at the city hall.
All the members of the board were
present, A. W. Trow, H. B. Graul,
E. A. Fraser, J. D. Billingsley
and C. C. Hunt. The last named
is the new appointee by the coun-
ty court to the directorship.—On-
tario Democrat.

Joe Smith, a young man living
a few miles east of Vale, was run
over by a runaway team which he
stopped on Main street Monday
morning, and quite seriously in-
jured. A heavy dray team had be-

come frightened and ran out of
the alley back of the Nelson block
and started down Main street,
when young Smith made a flying
tackle of the horse nearest him,
throwing the animal down and
stopping the runaway.—Vale En-

The death of Ernest Ferguson,
brother of Chas. Ferguson, was
sad news to his many Nyssa
friends. Only 18 years of age, he
succumbed to tuberculosis after a
few days' confinement in bed.
Apple Valley was his birth place.
He is survived by six brothers and
sisters besides both parents.

Mr. Homan Returns From Washington

The Ontario Democrat has
the following to say regarding
the efforts of W. F. Homan, who
has been to Washington in be-
half of the Dead Ox Flat irri-
gation district:

"Power for pumping is now
practically assured for the Dead
Ox Flat irrigation district, ac-
cording to W. F. Homan, who
returned Monday night from
the East. He spent some time in
Washington and interviewed
the heads of several bureaus of
the department of the interior,
receiving much encouragement
for the district.

The hopes of the district de-
pend upon the transmission of
power from power sites on the
Payette river, which have heret-
ofore been held under a revoc-
able permit by individuals in-
terested in the flat. The object
of Mr. Homan's trip to Wash-
ington was to secure on behalf
of the district a permanent per-
mit or title to the power site.
