ORDINANCE NO. 157

An Ordinance Prohibiting the Sounding of False Alarms of Fire; Fixing the Penalty for a Violation of the Provisions of This Ordinance; Repealing All Ordinances or Parts of Ordinances Inconsistent Herewith; and Declaring the Time When This Ordinance Shall Become Effective.

The People of Nyssa Ordain:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to make, or cause to be made, a false alarm of fire within the corporate limits of the town of Nyssa by ringing or sounding, or causing to be rung or sounded, any fire bell designed, intended and provided for making alarms of fire; provided, however, that no provision of this ordinance shall be construed to prevent proper and necessary use, under the direction of the Chief of the Fire Department, of any such fire bell for fire drills and practice of the fire department.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than 5 dollars nor more than 25 dollars for each violation thereof, and in default of payment of such fine the offender shall be imprisoned in the city jail one day for each two dollars of such fine.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.

Passed by the Common Council by unanimous vote this 21st day of July, 1914.
