Silage of
Importance
in Dairying

As dairying grows in importance
to this community the relative
value of stock foods becomes o-
practical interest. We append an
article by Professor R. R. Grave
of the O. A. C., that discusses the
value of silage and other succe-
nces. Besides the vegetable com-
position that enters into the stock
food problem must come the con-
sideration of the animal proteins
for calves and especially young
cows, such as are embraced in milk
or substitutes. The Jour-
nal's columns are open to all who
are interested along this line and
would like to receive for publica-
tion letters from the farmers tel-
ling their experiences with various
crops and what results have been
obtained. By so doing many ideas
may be brought to light that will
be of general benefit.

Oregon Agricultural College--
The relative value of roots, kale
and silage, the usual source of
silence for winter feeding, de-
pends upon their composition,
relative feeding values, cost
of production, keeping qualities
and convenience of feeding," says
Prof. R. R. Graves, head of the
O. A. C. dairy department.

The total digestible nutrients
in a ton of corn silage is 326
pounds. In a ton of red clover
silage the total is 224 pounds, but
the nutritive ratio is 1 to 6.9,
while in corn it is 1 to 11. The
digestible nutrients in a ton of
barley silage is 224 pounds, with a
ratio of 1 to 8.5. In rutabagas
the total is 186 pounds to the ton,
with a ratio the same as that of
barley. The digestible nu-
trients in a ton of kale are but
160 pounds, while the ration is
very narrow--1 to 2.8. It is also
noted that the nutrients of apple
silage are pretty high,
about 216 pounds to the ton.
