The second hand store near the Ontario Furniture Co. was destroyed by fire early Tuesday morning. The fire was well under way before it was discovered so it was impossible to save much of the stock.—Ontario Argus.

Work has been resumed on the Oregon Eastern Railroad that runs westward from Vale into Central Oregon. Also at Vale the Geo. F. Willey Co. started extensive operation in the Malheur County Oil fields, fully confident of success.

Two men went up to Boise from Nampa Wednesday and appeared before a justice there to plead guilty to assaulting a Chinaman, for which offense two innocent men were being held in jail there. As a result of this prick of conscience on the part of the men from here, the two guilty men were let off easily.—Nampa Leader Herald.

About the middle of the week Judge Bryan, authorized Receiver Smallwood, of the defunct Bank of Nampa, to disburse another dividend of 15 per cent to depositors. The sum to be paid out is \$27,302, a part of which was collected through the sale of the bank building and fixtures to the First National Bank of Nampa.—Nampa Leader Herald.

Deputy Sheriff Ben J. Brown made a capture early Monday morning that clears up the mystery surrounding seven different burglaries and thefts that have taken place in Vale and the surrounding country during the past few months, by the arrest of Ernest Norris and Luther Pruitt at the home of the former west of the city.—Vale Enterprise.

On Wednesday afternoon the business men of this town met and organized a permanent Fair Association for Jordan Valley. Mayor H. Scott, G. S. Parks and Thos. T. Kohout were selected as the executive committee, who were assured of hearty co-operation by all the citizens of the town and surrounding country to make the fair a grand success.—Jordan Valley Exp.

Last Saturday evening Street Commissioner Lackey found a man back of the Carter House in a semi-conscious condition. His left eye had been completely destroyed by a blow above causing the skull to be crushed. He also had a large hole in the top of his head. Just as to the cause of the man's condition the officers are puzzled, but it is thought that he was struck by a train and wandered back to town.—Ontario Argus.

The Chamber of Commerce held a special meeting Monday night, which was attended by practically every business man of this city, the purpose of meeting being for a discussion of the Fair Carnival for which preparations were being made by the Vale citizens with the assistance of the Civic Club.

Strong speeches endorsing the movement were made by nearly all the prominent business men of the city, and finally a motion was put and unanimously carried that endorsed the general plan as outlined in the Enterprise last week and guaranteeing the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce in making the Carnival a success.—Vale Enterprise.

Wooden Vessels Passing. It is still customary for the poorer classes in India to carry home water on the head. Earthenware vessels have hitherto been in use, but as aluminum vessels are becoming cheaper they are replacing them because of greater lightness.

TROUBLE AHEAD FOR BRE'R RABBIT

At last an effective way has been found to combat rabbits that infest the farming regions each year, and as a result, the little pests are being killed off in large numbers while the farmer sleeps.

On the government project in Hermiston district the new plan is working like a charm. Dairy salt and strychnine make up the agency that is depleting the ranks of the destructive animals. The farmers in that district have placed at different points over the land small receptacles containing the poisoned salt. Br'er rabbit, always fond of salt, takes a nibble at the mineral and soon dies from the effects of the tiny bit of strychnine that he gets with the more choice morsel.

As a result it is said that thousands of carcasses are lying scattered about the places where the poisoned salt has been placed, sending out anything but a pleasant odor during the high temperature. But crops are damaged less.

The proportion of the poison is one ounce to a pound of salt and a small vessel containing a tiny bit of the stuff is sufficient to cause the death of a large number of the pests.—Pendleton Tribune.

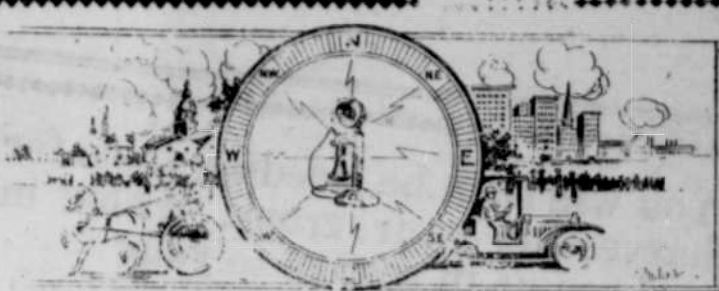
