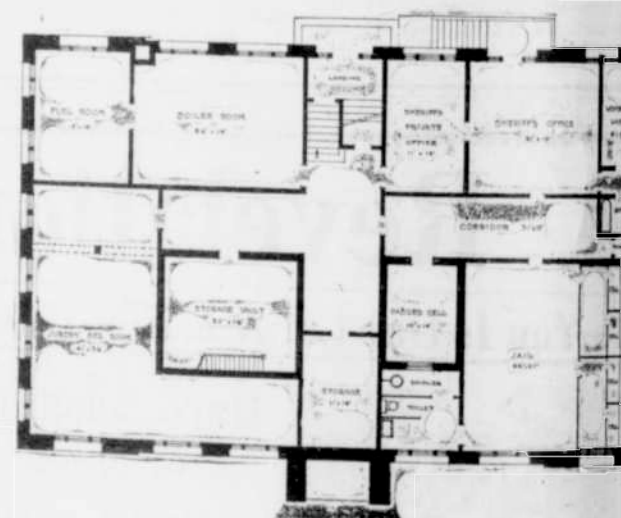
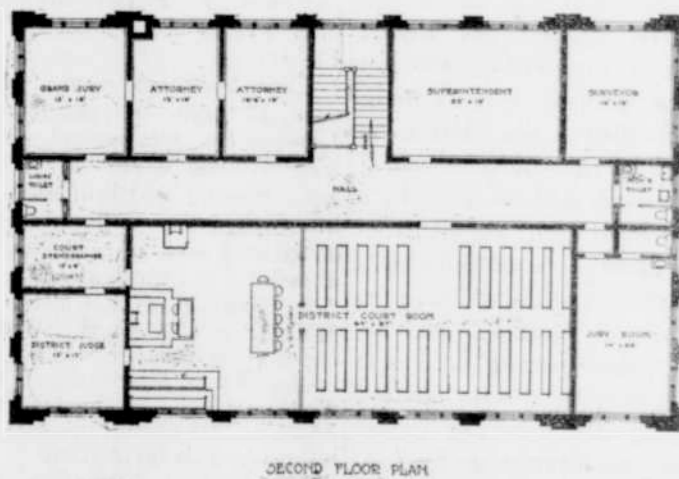
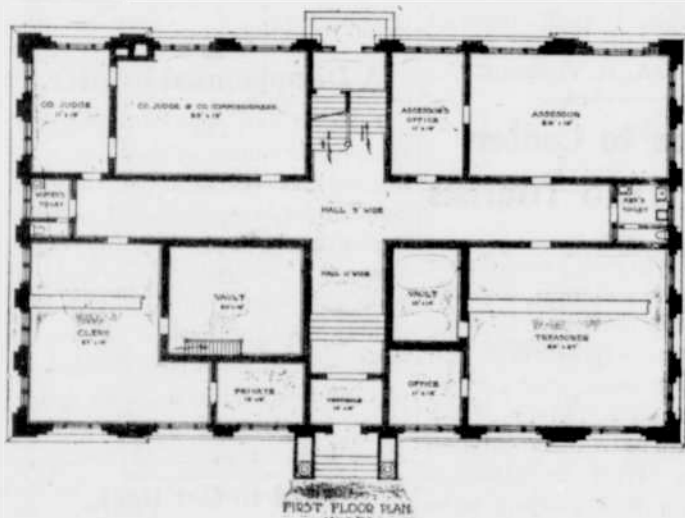
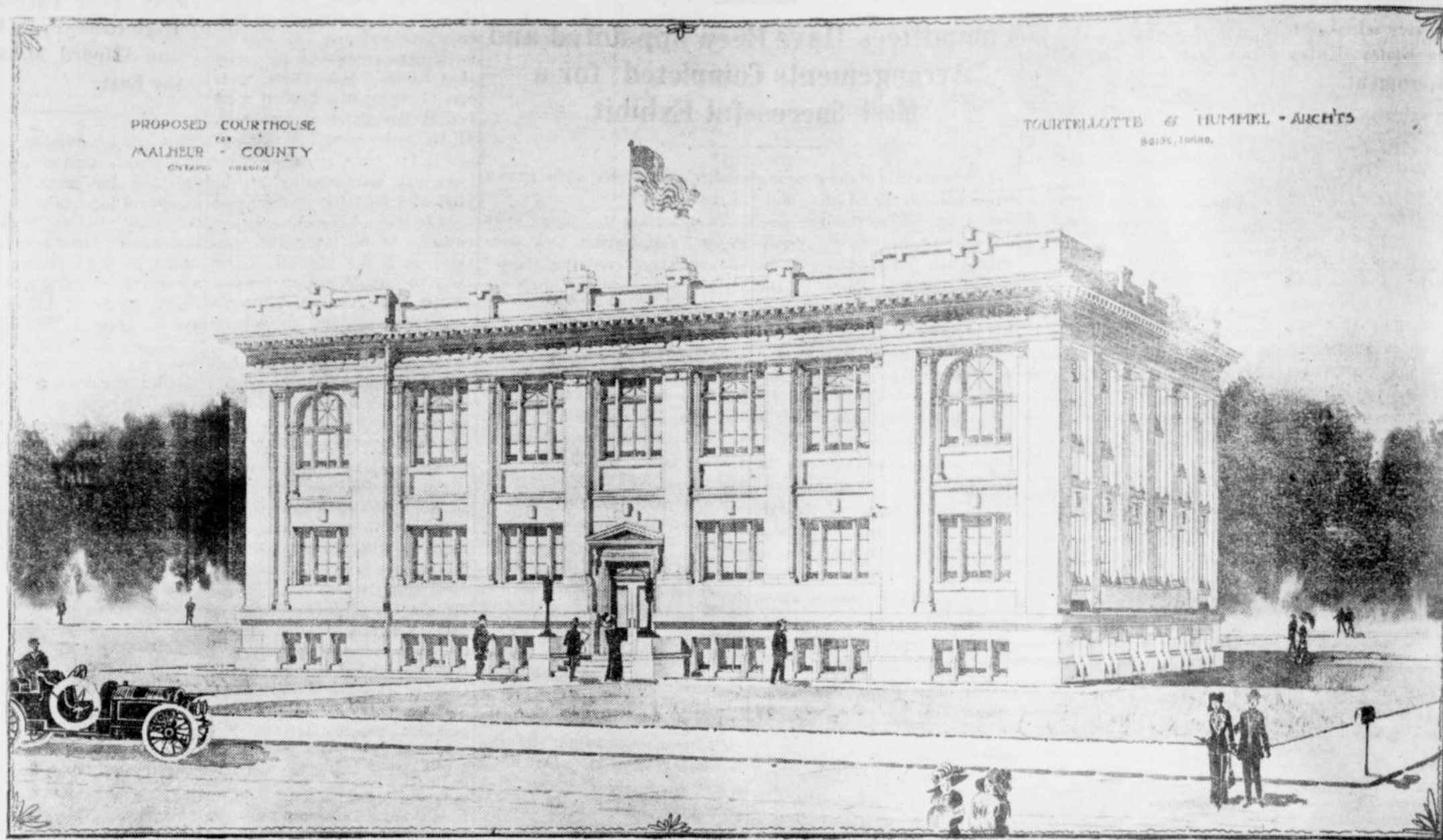


ONTARIO VOTES \$30,000 COURT HOUSE BONDS

On Tuesday, September, 29, at the Bond Election 574 votes were cast, only 8 votes being against the \$30,000 bond issue for the Court House. The Ontario National Bank and the First National Bank of Ontario purchased these bonds yesterday at par and the certificate for deposit of the \$30,000 has been issued.

CUT OF COURT HOUSE AND PLANS OF BUILDING TO BE BUILT BY ONTARIO



Description of Buildings, by Architects

The proposed new court house for Malheur county, to be built by the citizens of Ontario, Oregon, is 98x60 feet on the ground and consists of three floors—basement, first floor and second floor.

The basement story has a height of nine feet and the ceiling is five feet above the ground level. One-half of this story is planned for the county jail, which consists of the sheriff's public office 21x19 feet, sheriff's private office 11x19 feet, women's ward 8x15 feet with bath and toilet, padded cell 10x14 feet and jail 29x27 feet, which contains four steel cells with steel corridors. The jail also has a bath and toilet room in connection therewith.

The sheriff's office has a private entrance on the rear of the building, as well as an entrance from the corridor.

The walls and ceiling of the jail portion of this building will be constructed of reinforced concrete. All the windows in the jail portion of the building will be fitted with total proof steel window gratings.

The remainder of the basement consists of a large storage vault 16x20 feet, which has a stairway leading to vault in county clerk's office above. This vault is to be used as a storage vault for old county records. Alongside this

vault is a large dormitory for the use of the jurymen for sleeping quarters.

The boiler and fuel rooms are across the corridor from the vault and dormitory and are large and well suited to their use. The stairway from the basement leads to a landing on the ground level, on which level is the rear entrance to the building. From this landing the stairway continues to the first floor.

The first story of the building contains the administrative offices of the county. This story has a ceiling height of twelve feet. On the left of the main entrance corridor is found the quarters of the clerk of the county, consisting of a large public office 27x19 feet, a private office 9x13 feet and a record vault 16x20, which has an iron stairs leading to the storage vault in the basement. The public office is divided into a public space and a working space by a counter-desk running the full width of the room.

The treasurer's office on the right side of the main entrance has the following rooms: A public office 29x27 divided into a public space and a working space, a private office 11x12 and a vault 10x14 feet.

Across the hall which runs the length of the building on the

right is located the county assessor's office, a public office 28x18 feet and a private office 11x19 feet. On the left is located the county court, a room 28x19 feet, and a private office 11x19 feet for the use of the county judge and the county commissioners.

The vaults on this floor are fire proof and will be fitted with fire proof and burglar-proof doors.

At the ends of the longitudinal halls are found the women's and men's toilet rooms.

The second or top floor of the building is devoted principally to the uses of the district court, but the county school superintendent's office 25x19 feet and the county surveyor's office 16x19 feet are also located on this floor.

The district court room is 64x27 feet in size and is well proportioned and a splendidly lighted room, having a public space that will seat 150 spectators without crowding. In front of the bar is the judge's bench, the court stenographer's desk, the witness stand, the jury box and the attorney's table. To the rear of the judge's bench, and opening into the court room, are the district judge's chamber 15x17 feet and the court stenographer's office 15x9 feet. At the opposite end of the court room is located the jury room

14x22 feet opening into the hall. This room has a private toilet in connection.

The left portion of this story is divided into a grand jury room 15x19 feet and two rooms 13x19 feet and 12-6x19 for the use of the county attorney. The toilet rooms for men and women on this floor, are located at the ends of the hall over the toilet rooms on the first floor. This story has a ceiling height of fourteen feet.

Exterior.

The exterior of the building is designated in the classical style. The base course is 6.6 in height of concrete marked off to represent clean cut ashlar. The building above the base course will be faced with pressed brick. Large pilasters with Doric caps and bases of stone run through from the base course to the underside of the entablature. The parapet wall above the cornice is of brick with coping of stone. The windows are large and all have square heads except the second story windows in the end bays, which have semi-circular arches.

The main entrance doorway is crowned with a triangular pediment of stone, supported on carved stone brackets. The doorway is framed with a moulded stone architrave. The main en-

trance steps of concrete are flanked with stone abutments on which rest large electroliers of wrought iron.

Construction.

The foundation of this building will be of concrete with concrete footings. The walls of the superstructure will be of brick, faced with pressed brick. The vaults will have walls, floors and ceilings of reinforced concrete.

The partitions and floors will have wooden studs and wooden joists. The interior will be plastered with Gypsum plaster and the finish woodwork will be Oregon fir. The basement will have a concrete floor, the other floors being finished with Oregon fir flooring.

Mechanical Equipment.

The building will be heated with a steam heating system. All plumbing will be modern and up-to-date. The lighting will be laid out according to the latest and most scientific methods of electric lighting.

Cost.
