Systematic Effort Will Be Made to Discover Best System for Increasing Revenue of Malheur County Farmers.

There are a great many different advanced methods of farming that might be pursued to increase the income to be derived from the farms here in Malheur. There is much uncertainty as to the best method for these different ideas, that have been determined to have Mr. C. E. Hayes from the Extension Service of the Oregon Agricultural College come to this county April 24, and stay until May 13. During this period he will visit about 100 representative farms and find out as closely as possible all of the incomes and expenses of the last year.

Any questions will be asked. The yield of each crop of land, the yield of each crop, the cost of production, and the net received for the same. The value of livestock, value of cost of raising, and producing. The cost of seed, labor, machine, stock, insurance, etc. In anything related to the business of farming will be put in figures for answers will be strictly confidential, and the information given will be used in making up the average for the different classes of crops in the tabulated record to be returned to each individual farmer in which his own individual results will be given back, but to no other.

It is hoped to discover some facts to lead some of the farmers to their systems of farming successful systems. We wish to know which type of farm can raise which type of dairy, and what portion of the farm can be in pasture to find out if certain kinds of stock are more profitable than others.
