Road Land Grants Placed on Market

Vale, April 23.—A matter of much importance to Malheur county is the placing upon the market of the former military road land grants now owned by the Eastern Oregon Land company, a corporation with headquarters at San Francisco. Approximately 60,000 acres of good agricultural lands situated in the Willow creek and Cow valleys, in Malheur county, have been placed upon the market this week. It is the purpose to sell the land on the colonist, easy-terms plan. The Percy M. Johnson company of Vale has been appointed sole agent for these lands.

The land thus opened for colonization begins at a point five miles north of Vale and runs northwesterly in alternate sections to the Malheur-Harney county line.

Outlook for Bully Creek Good

D. M. Brogan, promoter of the Bully creek irrigation project of 20,000 acres adjoining Vale on the north, accompanied by Judge George E. Davis of Vale, made a trip to Philadelphia and other eastern points for the purpose of financing the completion of the project. It is stated upon good authority that the trip was successful to the extent that the prospects for financing the project are excellent. It is also stated that the outlook for the completion of the Bully creek project is now more favorable than ever before.

Criminal Docket Is Lightest in Years

Vale, April 27.—The criminal docket at this term of circuit court at Vale is the lightest in several years. The grand jury last week returned only three indictments and had only 14 witnesses before it, as compared with 38 indictments by the grand jury for the last term of court in January, when 75 witnesses called before it. For the last several years the usual number of witnesses summoned to appear before the grand jury here was from 50 to 75. It is thus seen that the expense to the taxpayers of the county for witness fees and jury trials for those charged with crime, will be much less for this term of court than for any one of several years past.

When the authorities here were questioned as to the cause of the improved state of affairs as shown in the great reduction in criminal cases for this term of court, they gave it as their opinion that it is due more than anything else to prohibition, which went into effect in Oregon the first of last January. The opinion was expressed that the crooks and others who do criminal acts as a result of imbibing too freely in intoxicants, moved out of the county and state when Oregon went "dry" in January.

Two Plead Guilty.

The three indictments returned by the grand jury last week were against Earl G. Love, charged with rape; William Hill, charged with attempt to extort money, and Pat Williams, charged with sheep stealing. Pope and Hill pleaded guilty before Judge Biggs Monday morning. They will be sentenced some time next week.

Love pleaded guilty to having enticed Lillian King of Arcadia, aged about 14 years, from her home Feb. 8, 1916, and took her to Pendleton, where they were arrested.

William Hill pleaded guilty to having attempted to extort \$300 from George Vanderhoof, a prominent rancher west of Vale.

Pat Williams, the third party indicted by the grand jury, is charged with the larceny of 10 sheep belonging to Rambo & Billingsly of Ontario. His trial has been set for next Tuesday.

The trial of Morris Powell, who is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon with attempt to kill Elmer G. Moudy, has been set for next Monday. Powell was tried on this charge at the January term of court. The jury disagreed.

H. Y. Blackwell, a prominent stockman, has brought suit against the Oregon Short Line for \$2700 damages.
