Farmers in Charge of
Corn Growing Contest

Corn, and more particularly the corn growing contest, was again given precedence at the meeting of the Malheur County Pomona Grange, held last Saturday at Brogan. Nearly every section of the county was represented at the meeting and considerable enthusiasm was aroused over the prospect of having a contest.

Owing to some complaint that in the past the contest has been confined principally to one section of the county it was decided that the farmers themselves should take over the contest and themselves furnish the prizes. To this end subscription blanks will be circulated throughout the various sections and the sums thus derived will be put up for prizes. By so doing all prejudice of sectionalism, it is believed, will be eliminated, and the Pomona will be at liberty to accept an invitation from any section for the Carnival. Unbounded appreciation was expressed for the assistance that has been given in the past, assistance that has made the contest possible, but now after two years of success, it was declared, the contest should stand on its own feet, and that the farmers should carry it through without further assistance.

The principal speaker in the afternoon was Prof. W. E. Brown, who holds the chair of horticulture at the O. A. C. Prof. Brown devoted the greater part of his discourse to an explanation of the marketing system proposed by the government for the Northwest, a system in the furtherance of which the federal government will spend about \$30,000, in an effort to place the marketing of fruit in the Northwest on a scientific basis.

Resolutions were passed commending the work that the Malheur County Fair is doing for the improvement of agricultural conditions in the county, and urging the farmers to take an active interest in the fair to make it a greater success than ever before. Resolutions were also passed favoring an increase in the rates for automobile licenses and the revenue thus derived to be used for the good roads movement.

Better Babies Contest
to Be Held in Vale

At a regular meeting of the Civic Improvement club, of Vale, held last week, committees were appointed to make preparations for the annual Better Babies Eugenic Test, for all Malheur county babies, to be held at Vale on the 6th, 7th and 8th of September.

The committees report that they anticipate having over 150 babies entered this year and will endeavor to mail invitations and application blanks to the parents of every baby between the ages of one and four years in the county.

This test is but one of the many being held all over the United States. Every mother in the county is urged to help make this test a success.—Vale Enterprise.

Rural Credits Bill.

If the proposed rural credits amendment is enacted by the people at the next regular election, it will go a long way toward relieving the farmer of the burden of debt and the excessive interest in commissions on the \$30,000, 000 farm indebtedness in this state. The average rate of interest on this indebtedness is but little under 94 per cent. Under the proposed bill the interest would be but five per cent. To this would be added one per cent to pay off the principal and at the end of 36 years the entire indebtedness would be wiped out, the interest paid up and the claim settled on a payment of but six per cent annually on the entire amount borrowed. This would save one-third the annual interest bill and wipe out the debt in thirty-six years.—O. A. C. Press Bulletin.

New Drainage
Bulletin Issued

A new 80-page bulletin on the drainage of "white lands" and other wet lands in Oregon, has been issued by the O. A. C. experiment station and is now ready for distribution. This bulletin is the result of many years' experience and many practical experiments to determine the depth, distance apart and size of tile, methods of organizing, laying out and constructing drainage systems, and treatment of the white lands and other wet lands after drainage. The demand for this information has become so tremendous that it is impossible to treat it in the regular correspondence. Five thousand copies of the bulletin have been issued in the first edition. It is the wish of the College that those seeking further information on drainage write for copies of the bulletin at their earliest convenience.

Auto Thieves Arrested.

A man by the name of Cookson was arrested by Sheriff Froman Saturday on the charge of stealing an auto from a party in Baker, Oregon. Officers from that town came after the man and took him there to face the charge. Harry Campbell and Orno Nadeau were arrested at Baker City as being implicated in the theft. A car was stolen by the latter two men when arrested. The car was the property of R. H. DeArmond of Vale. The men will be tried on the charge of taking the Baker car. One of them was an old offender of the law who was out on parole and was seeking a pardon at the same time.—Caldwell Newf.

Hogging Off Field Peas.

Hogs on green field peas at the Eastern Oregon branch experiment station gained at the rate of 480 pounds of pork, valued at \$33.60, per acre. Hogs on ripe field peas produced pork at the rate of 380 pounds, valued at \$26.60 per acre. "Green peas give a somewhat better return than ripe peas," says Superintendent Robert Withycombe. Results will depend upon the yield per acre, but the foregoing figures represent pretty accurately about what may be expected from hogging off an acre of field peas under normal conditions in that section of Eastern Oregon.
