ment for protection in case Mr.
Villa decides to entertain them.

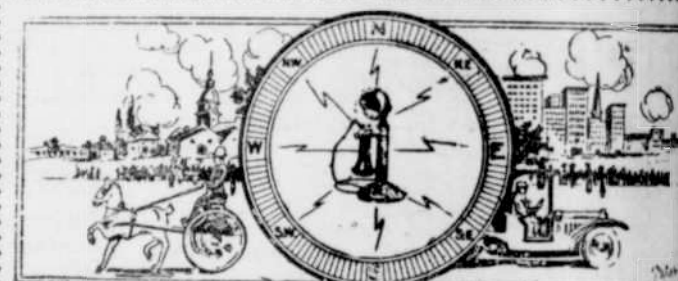
