Landmen for yeoman, landmen for electricians (general), plumbers and pitters, shipwrights, shipfitters, blacksmiths, boiler makers, painters, printers.

Enlistments in the following ratings, however, are being made, but this station has been limited to 25 men per week:

Apprentice seamen, machinists' mates (1st and 2d class), copper smiths, firemen (1st, 2d and 3d class), hospital apprentices, 1st and 2d class (only two per month), landmen for bakers, bakers (2d class), mess attendants (2d class), landmen for ships' cooks, ships' cooks (4th class), landmen for musicians, musicians (1st and 2d class), landmen for quartermaster (aviation) especially well qualified, landmen for machinists' mates (aviation), landmen for electricians (radio).

ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT

Made by A. P. Gibson, C. C. Smith and E. B. Butler, Jr., Auditing Committee

Nyssa, Oregon, August 7, 1917.

Having been duly appointed by the Board of Supervisors as provided by law to audit the books of the Treasurer and investigate the business of the District for the past year, we beg to report as follows:

On October 16, 1916, the Board of Supervisors made a levy against all lands, public highways, rights of way, and other property within the District as shown by the Drainage Tax Record for the purpose of bonding the District in amount of \$70,000, whereby funds might be available for the construction of a drainage system.

The bonds having been advertised for sale sealed bids were received and opened on Nov. 4, 1916, five bids being received, the highest and best bid being that of John E. Price & Co., for par and accrued interest at the rate of \$93.27 for every \$100.00 par value thereof, with 4 per cent interest from Jan. 1, 1917, on all balances from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds.

A good faith deposit of \$1,000.00 as part payment on the bonds was immediately made by John E. Price & Co.

Attorney C. C. Wilson prepared a transcript of all procedures leading up to the bond issue which was furnished for the convenience of the attorneys of John E. Price & Co., who promptly passed favorably on the legality of the bonds.

The bonds were printed and duly executed, after which they were forwarded to the National Bank of Commerce, Seattle, Washington, to be held in trust for John E. Price & Co., in accordance with a certain agreement entered into with the said John E. Price & Co. and the District, whereby the District was insured against loss should the said John E. Price & Co. fail to carry out their part of the contract.

The Treasurer received on Feb. 19, 1917, certificates of indebtedness of John E. Price & Co. in several denominations aggregating in amount \$68,489.00, covering the sale of the \$70,000.00 bond issue at \$93.27 and \$700.00 accrued interest from Nov. 1, 1916, to Jan. 1, 1917, less the \$1,000.00 good faith deposit.

The certificates are dated Jan. 1, 1917, and earn interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum till paid. Up to the present time the Treasurer has received on these certificates \$18,489.00 and \$368.32 accrued interest.

On Nov. 23, 1916, as shown by the Drainage Tax Record, the Board of Supervisors levied an assessment against all lands and other property in the District, the same being 6 per cent of the tax levy covering the \$70,000.00 bond issue for the purpose of providing and paying the interest to become due on said bonds and payable May 1 and Nov. 1, 1917.

From this assessment there has been turned in by the County Treasurer \$2,248.17, \$2,100.00 of which was used to pay the interest on the bonds due May 1, 1917.

There is due the District from the County Assessor \$2,842.59, which will eventually be collected the same as other county and state taxes and turned over to the Treasurer.

There are now \$2,409.37 of outstanding warrants. Of this amount \$1,335.04 is carried over from last year.

We have made a careful audit of the Treasurer's books and find all disbursements regularly authorized by the Board of Supervisors, and warrants duly signed by the President and attested by the Secretary, and all monies duly and regularly accounted for.
