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PACKING HOUSE AT APPLE VALLEY

The Apple Valley fruit packing house is now under course of construction by the Apple Valley Fruit Growers' association, will be the most up-to-date and efficient plant of its size in Idaho. It is 120 feet, with full cement storage plant in the basement. This is built with double cement walls with air spaces between and a capacity of from 10 to 40 cars. It is equipped with exhaust fans by means of which it is possible to change the air completely every ten minutes if so desired. With this storage until late in the spring is guaranteed to bring the fruit through first class condition.

The first floor, which is the same as used for the packing and sorting. The largest and most modern sorting and grading machine in Idaho has recently been installed here. It has a capacity of three carloads daily, or 100 boxes of apples. Matthews steel gravity conveyors have been put in with the packing house and basement. These in connection with the sizing and sorting machine, make it unnecessary for boxes to be lifted from the time they leave the unloading platform until they reach the cars of the cold storage basement. The apples are taken from the unloading platform by the conveyors to the sorters and after being sorted, sized and graded by the machine are packed from the packers by the employees. They are then by the conveyors to the ladders, after the lid is put on are taken by conveyor either to the cars or to storage in the basement by the conveyors and automatic elevator.

The whole building will be equipped with electric lights and motors from line now being put in, and water is supplied by the automatic pump and water system recently installed for service of this and other large buildings at Apple Valley. It is planned to ship from 100 to 125 loads of apples from the Apple Valley plant this season, this being the best estimate. Sixty thousand have been purchased. Most of the fruit will grade fancy or extra fan and will be of the Jonathan, Rome and Winesap varieties.

About 125 people will be employed in packing the fruit, at least 46 women sorters and sorters, and 10 or more besides others. The employment will last two or three months, starting last. The apples are shipped under special "Soo" brand belonging to the Apple Valley Fruit Growers' association. It is expected that the market will be largely in the east. C. Watson and E. G. Johnson are managing the Apple Valley packing for the Apple Valley Fruit Growers' association. They are handling the prune crop independently.—Review.

It is officially announced that cheese does not, as a rule, follow regular eating of cheese. This is borne out by a long series of experiments. HOME-GROUND WHEAT BREAD
Over a mixture of 1 tablespoonful of sugar and 1½ teaspoonfuls salt in a mixing bowl pour 1½ cups of hot water or skim milk. When the liquid has become lukewarm, add ½ cake dry yeast or 1 gill liquid yeast and 1½ cups of home-ground wheat flour. Set overnight to rise. In the morning add 1½ cups flour, beat well, put into greased pan, allow to rise until the bulk is doubled, and bake.
