Whereas, It appears that the assessed valuation of the taxable property in Nyssa, Oregon, for the year 1917 is the sum of one hundred and fifty-seven thousand, nine hundred and fifteen dollars, (\$157,915) and it is estimated that the valuation of the public service Corporation property in Nyssa, as assessed by the State tax commission, will be the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000), making a total valuation of taxable property in the sum of \$197,915; and

Whereas, It is determined by the common council of Nyssa, Oregon, that the following amounts are necessary for the ensuing year, to-wit:

General fund—\$1484.36, being 7½ mills on the dollar;
Street fund—\$791.66, being 4 mills on the dollar;

Interest and Sinking fund—\$2177.06, being 11 mills on the dollar; now

Therefore be it resolved, that there be and hereby is levied on all the taxable property within the Town of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, taxes for the year 1917 as follows, to-wit:

General fund—7½ mills on the dollar of assessed valuation.

Street fund—4 mills on the dollar of assessed valuation;

Interest and Sinking fund—11 mills on the dollar of assessed valuation; and

Be it further resolved, That the Recorder of the Town of Nyssa, Oregon, is hereby instructed to certify this Resolution to the County Clerk of Malheur County, Oregon, for extension of the same on the 1917 tax roll, of Malheur County Oregon.
