Cresshill, N. J. Jan. 1, 1918.—Mr. J. H. Forbes, Dear Friend: In reply to yours of the 28th, I was glad to get a letter from an old friend. It always makes a fellow feel good, you know. Of late several of my Nyssa friends have written me and I sure appreciate it very much. But, before going any farther I must wish you and yours a happy and prosperous New Year.

After all it hardly seems real, this war, but it is and very real at that! A year ago this New Year's day we boys were at Boise happy in that that freedom after a six months strain on the Border was in sight. Little did we think that another year would see us in a like position only emarked on a far greater task, the largest the world's ever known.

As I have written this is the way things ran thru my mind as I awoke on the first day of the New Year. I heartily hope as all my Nyssa friends do, that another turn of the wheel of time will see democracy world wide and dominant. Army life at present is "soft" as we boys term it, in fact never before has it been so easy since I can remember. We have at our disposal, good barracks and every needed convenience. And as the weather will not permit training no work is possible except the necessary duties.

At this date the East is experiencing one of the severest cold snaps known for years as you have probably seen by the papers. But, as I have said we are comfortable. I only wish that the thousands of poor in New York might be so well provided for.

I used to think the stories of New York and of the suffering of her poor was all so much "rot", but know better now. If only I could tell you of all my trip in New York and other experiences, but we will leave them till after the war.

Any time you feel like writing to me I shall appreciate it. Give my regards to all.

We Must Supply Large Quantity of Wheat for Allies

Millions of men have been taken from wheat raising and have gone into the trenches. Fields have been laid waste by the enemy. Food supply ships have been sunk by submarines. Crops in other countries have been poor. These are some of the reasons why there is a shortage of wheat and why we are asked by Mr. Hoover to conserve in our kitchens and at our tables.

Four hundred million bushels of wheat is a large amount, but we must supply it. In one way or another we must get it together here and send it across the water to those associated with us in this war. We cannot do this unless we are willing to use some other food for a part of the wheat we would ordinarily consume. That is why we are urged as a patriotic duty to observe wheatless days strictly and on other days to use only the minimum amount of wheat foods, wasting absolutely none. The aid of every individual is needed. Are you saving your share of that 400,000,000 bushels of wheat?

Our Attitude To- ward Our Enemies

(From President's Message, Dec. 4.)

"We do not wish in any way to impair or to rearrange the Austrian Hungarian Empire. It is no affair of ours what they do with their own life, either industrially or politically. We do not purpose or desire to dictate to them in any way. We only desire to see that their affairs are left in their own hands, in all matters, great or small.

"We shall hope to secure for the people of the Balkan Peninsula and the Turkish Empire the power and the right to make their own lives safe, their own fortunes secure against oppression or injustice and from the dictation of foreign courts or parties.

"And our attitude with regard to Germany herself is of a like kind. We intend no wrong against the German Empire, no interference with her internal affairs. . . . We are in fact fighting for her people's emancipation from fear along with our own—from the fear as well as from the fact of unjust attack by neighbors, or rivals or schemers after world empire. No one is threatening the existence or independence of the peaceful enterprise of the German Empire."
