

"Not Much Time to Spare, But Will Read Journal"; Says Letter

Julien T. Lowe, who left for Camp Lewis a couple of weeks ago to enlist, writes to the Journal to have his paper sent to "Julien T. Lowe, Co. A, O. T. C." He says:

I have not yet been able to locate Cosgrove. The address you gave me ie. Ward No. 15, Base hospital, does not exist any more, but some of the men at the hospital knew of him and said he had been transferred to this training camp. There are about 700 men here, so I have not been able to find him yet.

The original plans for this camp have been changed considerably. There are more men than at first planned and instead of enlisting those of us from the colleges who did not already belong to the army, they gave us the choice of leaving the camp and going home or 2nd, enlisting in any of the regular branches as a private, or 3rd, staying here and being drafted on January 5. Most of the men decided to be drafted and stay. I don't know why they made this change, but it doesn't make much difference to me anyway. We haven't any spare time at all here but I am going to take time to read the Journal when it comes. Home papers are about as rare a prize around here as letters.

Give my thanks to some around Nyssa who contributed to the Y. M. C. A. fund with which this stationery, pen and ink were bought. The Y. M. is doing a big thing here by furnishing an amusement center where everyone gathers and drives away spells of blues of homesickness. It is also the only place where you can get cigarettes and candy, etc., without paying hold-up prices.

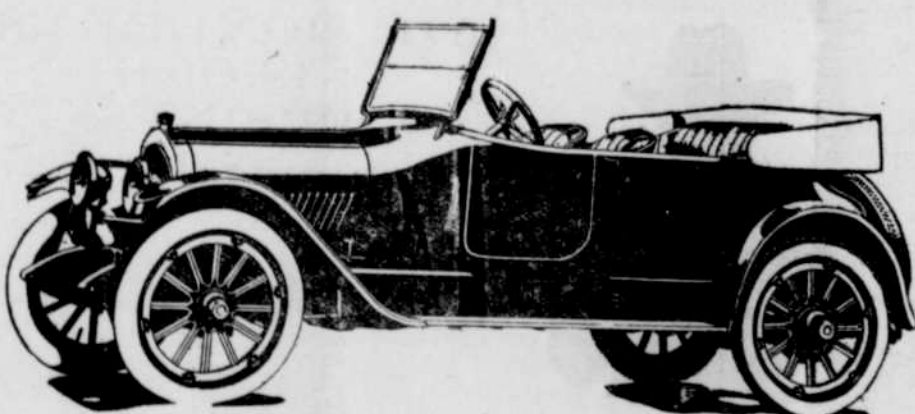
