THE END OF THE WORLD.

The poor are not the only class of people we have with us always. Those who prophesy the end of the world can also be included in this classification. As was expected, the present condition of the world has occasioned a flood of these prophecies. The Rev. R. O. Hadley, representative of the Bible society of Brooklyn, N. Y., in a recent lecture in Boise, said: "The Gentile time is closing and the kingdom of God is to be established at Jerusalem and from there spread all over the world." He also said: "We are no longer living in a 24-hour day but in the thousand-year day." This latter fact seems to have escaped the attention of the leaders of our labor organizations, who are striving harder than ever for an "eight-hour day." It's going to require some adjustment to arrange a satisfactory working schedule on the basis of a thousand-year day.

Prophecies of the second advent of Christ has been a popular pastime ever since Christ was on earth before, and one that never seems to lose its zest, in spite of the many failures of former prophets. It's a harmless amusement as long as people don't take it seriously enough to let it interfere with their business. The early Christians at Jerusalem sold all their possessions and had everything in common, being under the impression that they had enough to keep them until Christ's coming. There have been people in our own day who have robbed themselves in white and ascended the house-tops in order to be ready to meet Christ when He should appear at a certain specified time.

The reason that all former prophecies of this time have been wrong, according to Rev. Hadley, is because the Bible chronology figured by Bishop Usher and used ever since, has been found to be 124 years out of the way, and the events mentioned in Jeremiah should have been figured to mean the year 1914. Presumably the present chronology is of the genuine, name-blown-in-the-bottle kind and the prophecies will be fulfilled according to schedule.

We firmly believe that the world will be a much better place to live in after the war than it ever has been before, and to that extent Christ's kingdom may be said to have been set up on earth, but those who, with Rev. Hadley, expect the present order to pass away amid great confusion and be followed by Messiah's kingdom are very apt to be disappointed.

Russia's fate is a good illustration of the folly of trying to make peace with Germany before she is whipped. The fatuous belief of the Russians that peace could be had at any time simply for the asking caused them to break their agreement with the allies and place themselves in the power of Germany. Had they stayed in the game and acted like men instead of foolish children Germany would have been whipped by this time and Russia could have had a real peace. IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, to-wit: the 15th day of February, 1918, or within six weeks if served personally without the State of Oregon, and if you fail so to appear and answer the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in the complaint, to-wit: for a decree dissolving the bonds of matrimony heretofore and now existing between you and the plaintiff, and for an absolute divorce from the defendant; and for the custody and care of the minor child to be awarded to plaintiff; and that a just portion of the real property to be decreed to plaintiff and for such other and further relief as may seem meet and equitable to the Court, and for costs and disbursements.

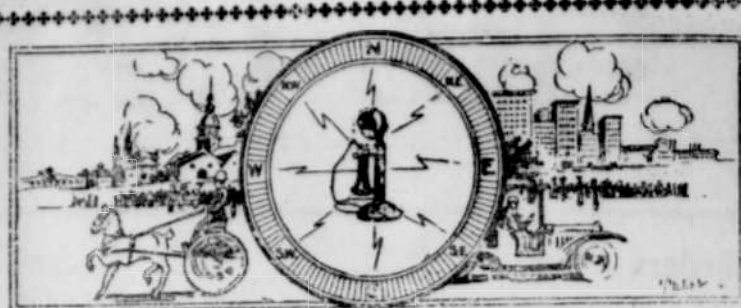
