PARENTS AND TEACHERS

Conditions did not seem favorable this year for continuing the Parent-Teacher association, but the teachers at least have missed it. There is no doubt about the need of cooperation in school work and not the least duty of a parent is to let the teacher know what the feeling is at home, about the school work. Teachers more than any other workers need a word of encouragement from pleased employers. And a word of frank criticism is equally valuable to them and the school authorities as well. During the coming months when the weather is favorable and school programs are given, it is hoped that many parents will visit the school and take time to talk privately with the teacher.

More value will be gained from this visit if each understands the other person's point of view. It is hard for the teacher to appreciate the interest a parent has in one particular child and it is even more difficult for parents to understand that the teacher has forty pupils like this boy or girl and so must have a different point of view.

A good teacher thinks of every pupil as a human being with certain qualities of character. She sets before her a picture of what he ought to be at the end of the year and then begins to train him where he most needs help. She is anxious to know the parents, to find out how much help she can count on from the home.

It makes no difference to the teacher whether the child is rich or poor, foreign or native born, related to the school board member or one of the faculty. She views with impartial eye his capabilities and his progress and does with him what she thinks will be for his greatest good. If she makes a mistake in this, it is never intentional but because human nature is very hard to judge in advance.

The parent often helps the teacher by telling about the peculiarities of the child, but the responsibility for deciding what to do is upon the teacher. For this reason she often does the hard thing or the disagreeable thing for the sake of her pupils, and the parents don't understand why. It is to clear up these misunderstandings that we urge parents to visit the school. There is a book in the public library that will help both parents and teachers in this perplexing work education. It is, "A Montessori Mother," by Dorothy Canfield Fischer.

Little Corn Held by Dealers in East and South

Small stocks of corn in the hands of dealers in New England and other eastern and southern states, with the exception of Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia, where surpluses were produced, are indicated by reports to the Department of Agriculture. Actual available supplies in the southeastern states are said to be greater than ever before, although the amount of corn in the hands of distributors and other dealers is much below normal.

Most districts in the southeastern states have sufficient supplies for local needs, while dealers in many places, especially Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, and Florida, have shipped large quantities of corn to the larger markets.

Does Not Employ Association Organizers

News of schemes to swindle farmers by men advertising to be authorized farm-loan association organizers is met by the statement by the Federal Farm Loan Board that organizers are not employed.

In order to borrow money under the farm-loan act, farmers must organize co-operative national farm-loan associations in their local communities. It is a violation of a ruling of the Farm Loan Board for a national farm loan association or a joint-stock land bank to spend money for promotion purposes.

Training School for Army Chaplains

A typical daily schedule of the course of training at the recently established school for army chaplains at Fort Monroe includes military drill, military law, international law, army regulations, military hygiene, organized recreational work and sectional conferences.

Including the large number recently appointed there are now nearly 600 chaplains in service, and this number will gradually be increased with the passage of expected legislation permitting the appointment of one chaplain for every 1200 officers and men.

Cartoonists' Work Will Boost Third Liberty Loan

The work of the foremost cartoonists of the country will be used during the sale of the Third Liberty Loan Bonds. Drawings will be used in a wordless booklet and a daily cartoon service.

The booklet, containing all the cartoons, will be distributed by millions. It will consist only of drawings. The cartoons will also be divided evenly between afternoon and morning papers.

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR MALHEUR COUNTY.

To Albert Edgar Chapman, the above named defendant:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, to-wit: the 15th day of February, 1918, or within six weeks if served personally without the State of Oregon, and if you fail so to appear and answer the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in the complaint, to-wit: for a decree dissolving the bonds of matrimony heretofore and now existing between you and the plaintiff, and for an absolute divorce from the defendant; and for the custody and care of the minor child to be awarded to plaintiff; and that a just portion of the real property to be decreed to plaintiff and for such other and further relief as may seem meet and equitable to the Court, and for costs and disbursements.
