ANENT PROPHECIES.

A valued subscriber one day this week criticised a recent editorial in the Journal on the end of the world saying "I don't think it was very sensible." We cheerfully admit that it wasn't much of an editorial. We have no pride in its authorship and our feelings were not hurt at its condemnation. As an excuse for its not being "sensible," however, we will say that the subject is not one that lends itself readily to sensible comment. It is difficult to give serious consideration to a claim based upon an ancient prophecy written in figurative language, the meaning of which at best can only be guessed at, when so many previous predictions based upon this same prophecy remain unfulfilled. Shortly after the great San Francisco earthquake we were solemnly assured by a prominent Adventist of Milton that it foretold the end of the world.

We frankly admit that we haven't any faith in Biblical predictions as a means of ascertaining the date on which the world will come to an end, especially one written in symbolic language. Ten years from now, when the war is over and the world has resumed its normal condition it will be interesting to note what excuse will be given for this latest failure of the world to cease operations according to schedule.

Oregon Is Now on a Fifty-Fifty Basis

Oregon is now on a 50-50 basis; that is, for every pound of white flour purchased another pound of some kind of substitute must be bought to go with it. County Judge Geo. W. McKnight, chairman of the Malheur County food administration committee, is in receipt of the following telegram from W. B. Ayer, state food administrator for Oregon, which explains the situation:

Portland, Or., March 11.
Hon. George W. McKnight,
Vale, Oregon.
Owing to the absolute necessity that this country furnish wheat for shipment to our army abroad and to the people of France I have received positive instructions that no sales of flour can be made without an equal quantity of substitutes and I am putting the order into effect today. This will undoubtedly inconvenience many of our people, but they must thoroughly understand that it is an absolute necessity and the time has arrived when we are called upon to come through and do our full part. Please give publicity.

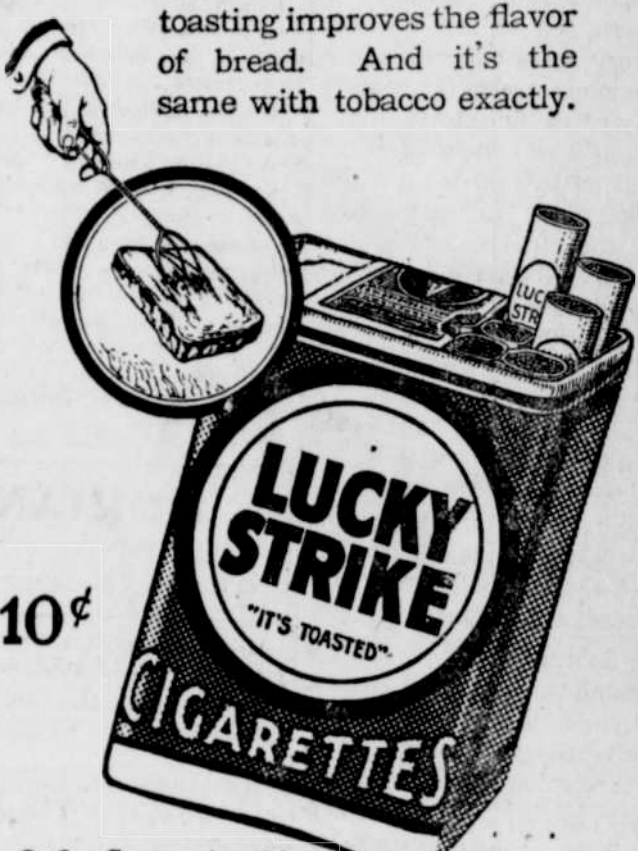
