Help Support the Armenian Relief Fund

In spite of the fact that the people are being called upon at the present time to support the Third Liberty Loan drive they should not forget the Armenian Relief Fund which is being raised to keep the women and children of stricken Armenia from starvation.

It requires only a comparatively small sum from each person to raise the quota assigned to this district, which is \$760. Any sum from a penny up is accepted. It is estimated that \$5 will support an Armenian child for one month. This small sum per month will save a human life. If the life of some child in our midst could be saved by the payment of \$5 per month the amount would be subscribed a hundred times over. Let us extend our sympathies to the stricken of foreign lands and aid them to the extent of our ability. A comprehensive system has been worked out for raising the fund and everyone will be given an opportunity. A good plan for aiding is for an organization or association to subscribe \$5 for the support of a child. The adoption agreement is as follows:

"Whereas, We, the undersigned, desire to adopt an orphan child in Bible lands, we promise to provide five dollars the first of each month for one year."

J. Boydell is chairman of the committee having charge of this work and any information desired can be secured of him.

Facts We Should Know About 3rd Liberty Loan

The Nyssa district for the Third Liberty Loan is bounded on the north by the Emison waste-way and extending east in a direct line to the Snake river and west to the Shoestring ditch; on the east by Snake river, on the south by the Snake and Owyhee rivers and on the west by the Shoestring ditch.

Malheur County's quota is \$269,000. Nyssa's quota is \$21,400.

Malheur County subscribed to Second Liberty Loan 82 per cent of its quota. Nyssa subscribed 66 per cent of her quota.

The Third Liberty Loan Bonds will be dated May 9, interest 4 1/2 per cent. Subscriptions will be received by all banks from April 6 to May 4, inclusive, and payments may be made in cash or as follows:

5 per cent on application.
20 per cent May 28.
35 per cent on July 16.
40 per cent on August 15.

The slogan for Oregon is "Over the top in a week."

Everybody having an income is expected to buy a bond in proportion to his means. It is hoped that the loan will be so greatly oversubscribed that it will not be necessary to float another before late in the fall.

When you have subscribed for a bond your name will appear on the Honor Roll, which will be on display in a prominent place.

The local committees in charge are making preparations for a complete canvass, but it is hoped that all who can will place their subscriptions in time to "Go over the top in a week."
