WHAT THE TEST SHOWED.

"Above all, they were American soldiers," said an admiralty official in London yesterday. He was speaking of the Tuscania and of the discipline and self-control exhibited by our young troops in the face of death. We have reason to be glad of this, both for the comparatively small loss of life entailed and for the indication we have of how our soldiers will acquit themselves under the grim task which awaits them on the soil of France. The German casuists may sneer about officers not being made by pinning epaulettes on them and soldiers by putting them in khaki. But what happened on the Tuscania is a warning to the Kaiser's mathematicians and logicians to revise their estimates of the two years it will take before our army makes itself felt, says New York Evening Post. What the raw London volunteers did in the Ypres trenches in October, 1914, against the flower of the Prussian guard, what French grandfathers have been doing in the trenches these three years and a half, that our young men will do, when the need arises, in the same cause that rallied London clerks and middle-aged French peasants against the most highly trained army in the world.

Loyalty has acquired an immense accession of power as a working force in human life. It has been born in millions of hearts which never before had felt the inspiration of a great cause, and it has deepened its roots in hearts that were loyal already. It has expanded to a new scale and won a new loftiness. At this moment the growth of loyalty is the most promising thing in the world. It contains the seeds of a thousand spontaneous reformations, writes L. P. Jacks in Atlantic. We have more to hope from it than from any one, or all, of the schemes, plans, and programs for the "reconstruction of society" which have poured from the study and the press during the last three years.

The British and French at the fighting front pay a high tribute to the intelligence and quick grasp of training details by the American troops. One fatal defect in the German calculations in this world battle was the inability to grasp the predestined failure of an army of military machines to win in the end over armies of thinking men.

A writer in the New York Times urges the public to eat muskrats and field mice. The muskrat, he says, is better than rabbit, while the field mouse is compared to the popular reed bird. And he adds, the field mouse is not a mouse at all.

An army order in France forbids the men to swear at the mules. And those of the mules who have been in the regular army will sorely miss the good old times when spoken to in a language and a manner they do not understand.

It's all right to boom the sheep industry; but lovers of the dog are likely to object to the effort to encourage sheep raising by waging a war of extinction upon the dog. In all the previous history of the world the dog has existed alongside of the sheep. The shepherd dog has guarded the sheep from the wolf, besides warning his master against prowling thieves and barking to wake him when the house was on fire. At the present moment the dog is useful in war, says Milwaukee Wisconsin. It is the untrained dog that kills sheep, and for the sheep-killing dog his owner should be held responsible.

Under the provisions of an edict issued by President Carranza, it is reported, a head tax of eight dollars, American gold, will be imposed upon all persons leaving Mexico to enter the United States. The head tax collected from persons entering Mexico is 25 cents. There are many who will concede that it's worth a good deal more to get out of Mexico than to get into it, conditions in that country being what they are at the present time.

New conditions are bringing in strange customs. Gotham street car conductresses when in the cars not on duty, are ordered to give their seats up to passengers. Epidemics of typhus and other diseases reported from different parts of Russia are the outcome of starvation and general demoralization. There is fear that the situation will not begin to grow better until after it has been considerably worse.

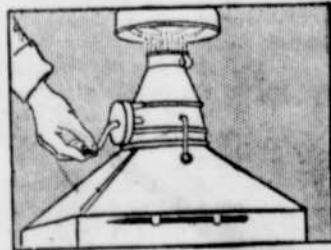
