The lands of Austria-Hungary are pleasant lands, rich and varied. The peoples are endowed with remarkable gifts. But poverty and illiteracy are the lot of the majority. Agriculture is primitive. Mineral resources have not been surveyed. The remarkable wealth of water power runs to waste. For this state of affairs the responsibility rests partly with a grasping and incompetent monarch and a time-killing bureaucracy, says New Republic. "It has been calculated that to transport such a small thing as the making out of a tax receipt, 23 officials have a finger in the pie, with as many signatures, counter-signatures, errors, beginnings all over again and final adjustments." Sometimes, when one feels despondent about Washington, it is a healthy thing to read about Vienna. Relatively considered, we have an efficient government, after all.

"If ever there was a time in the history of this country when we must stand together that time is right now," said Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the national war garden commission. "Are you going to sit by and ask the boys you have sent to the trenches to save food? Help to feed yourself by planting a garden in your back yard or a vacant lot. Ask the national war garden commission for a free garden planting book. Resign from the Knackers' club and join a garden club. Do something to help! Only the everlasting teamwork of every blooming soul will win this war."

There is no way of getting out of the payment of federal income tax if one is in receipt of income subject to the levy. The only question will be as to whether to defer the payment to June 15 or make it earlier. To those who pay in advance there is a concession of three per cent. This and the fact that the government needs the money should stimulate early payment.

The introduction of plain language into diplomacy with words meaning exactly what they say, is another startling change which the war is bringing into the conduct of world affairs. Cynical statesmen who adhere to the old idea, that words are given us to conceal our thoughts, will be hopelessly out of date.

The acreage of winter wheat in France this year is enormously greater than a year ago, and the condition reported on January 1 was eight per cent better. This is fortunate, as the French are great consumers of bread.

Sugar sent to the bottom of the sea by enemy submarines cannot always be prevented by Americans, but sugar waste in the bottom of the sea and coffee cups is to be severely condemned in this national crisis.

The information that the espionage evidence gathered against German spies had been stolen from the censor's office in New York, suggests that the system of censorship needs censoring.

BUILDING NOT TO BE DISCOURAGED

That the ban has been put on dwelling house construction by Mr. McAdoo is now retraced in the following statement by the secretary himself:

"I have your letter advising that I have been reported in the public press as having 'appealed to the property owners not to construct any homes or buildings during the war.' This is entirely erroneous. I have said that building operations which are not required to protect the health or provide for the comfortable needs of our people or to supply facilities necessary for the proper conduct of the war should be postponed.

"As you know I have no authority to direct that building operations be curtailed. I have merely suggested that unnecessary building of that kind be postponed until after the war. Such postponement I am sure, would help win the war, but every patriotic man must be determined by his own conscience in the matter and must decide for himself if he can postpone the erection of a contemplated building until the war is over.

"Compliance with this suggestion may cause some inconveniences which are greatly to be deplored, but such inconveniences are an unavoidable incident to the war. The situation must be viewed from a national and not from a local standpoint.—
