MILITARISM MUST BE CRUSHED.

A league of 23 civilized nations spontaneously organized to protect the world from the most efficient brigandry known in modern history has demonstrated a spirit of human brotherhood never before realized and gives reasonable ground of hope for a permanent League of Nations pledged to maintain the elemental rights of humanity against every form of militarism and organized tyranny. For the achievement of this great end the present league must win a decisive victory in the present world war against a military power which glorifies war, denounces arbitration, disregards treaties, repudiates the laws of nations, the laws of war, the law of humanity and the laws of God, and has murdered non-combatants in cold blood, mutilated little children, raped defenseless women and sung hymns of praise, marched in triumphant processions, and struck off medals in honor of its crimes. There can be no hope of a world peace until this military power is utterly destroyed and its subject peoples are set free from its rule.

MUST BE REAL PEACE

The ideals we cherish and the material interests our nation develops are based upon peace among all nations. Therefore we shall not be satisfied with the restoration of peace alone, but shall insist upon the assurance that this peace, which has been achieved through the world's great sacrifice of lives and treasure, shall not serve as a mere truce to enable Germany to prepare for another war, but shall be a peace to endure for many generations to come. Otherwise the great sacrifice will have been made in vain. The American people demand a dictated peace following the unconditional surrender of Germany's military power.

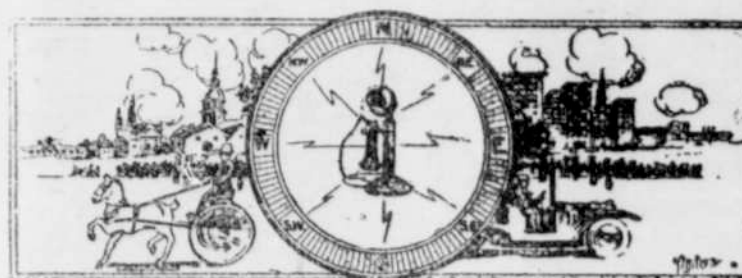
