MEAT SUBSTITUTES

CHEESE

Cheese, Corn and Potato Scallop
1 1/2 c cooked potatoes, diced, 1 c canned corn, 2 c cheese. Arrange the potatoes and corn in a greased baking dish in alternate layers with the cheese sauce. Cover the top with buttered crumbs, and bake the dish in a moderate oven for about 25 minutes.

Cheese Pudding

1 c pearl tapioca, 1 c water, 1 c milk, 4 T grated cheese, 2 eggs, 1 T butter, 1/2 t salt, 1/2 t mustard. Soak the tapioca in the water for 1 hr or longer. Add the milk. Bring the mixture to the boiling point and cook it over hot water until it is soft—about 30 minutes. Add the cheese, beaten yolks of eggs, and seasonings. Beat the whites of the eggs until they are stiff and fold them lightly in the cheese mixture. Turn it into a greased baking dish, set the dish in a pan of hot water and bake it in a moderate oven until it is brown—about 30 minutes.

Cheese Cutlets

1 c mashed potatoes, 1-3 c grated cheese, 1/2 c cooked lima or navy beans, ground, 2 T minced pimento, 1/2 t poultry seasoning, 1 t salt, paprika, 1/2 t curry powder. Combine the ingredients and shape the mixture into cutlets about 1/2 inch thick. Brown them in a small amount of hot fat and serve them with horse-radish sauce.

Cottage Cheese Salad Dressing

1/2 c cottage cheese, 1 egg yolk, 4 T salad oil, 1/2 t mustard, 1/2 t salt, 2 t vinegar or lemon juice. Add the beaten egg yolk to the cheese and stir it well.

Add the oil and seasonings and beat the dressing well. A smoother dressing can be made from cottage cheese which is made with junket than from ordinary cottage cheese. The dressing is somewhat like a stiff mayonnaise.

Duchess Soup

1 onion, 2 T fat, 1 T rice flour, or 2 T sago or minute tapioca, 1 qt milk, 1 egg or 2 egg yolks, 1/2 c grated cheese, 1 t salt paprika. Cook the onion in the fat until tender, but not brown. Remove the onion, add the flour; then the milk gradually, saving out 1-4 c. Cook until smooth and add seasoning. If sago or tapioca is used in place of flour add it to the milk and cook 15 minutes. Pour the soup over the egg beaten with 1/4 c of cold milk. Add the grated cheese and serve immediately.
