Thos. Canham Will Return to Nyssa

The war closing from an industrial standpoint was hardly noticed here. The cry for skilled men still is unsatisfied.

With All My Heart I Wish You God Speed

Theodore Roosevelt in sending the American Committee for relief in the Near East a check for \$1,000. (covering his contribution from the Nobel Peace Prize Fund) said:

"It was a great pleasure to hear you speak at Christ Church. The plight of your countrymen—the Assyrian Christians and the Armenians—and the high devotion and gallantry shown by the Assyrian Christians and the Armenians, have commended the deepest sympathy and the most unqualified admiration of the American people. As I listened to your account of the dreadful situation of your people, my heart was so moved that I wished it were possible for all our nation to have vividly brought home to them the facts that you presented. With all my heart I wish you God Speed in the work of relief you have undertaken for the Christians in Western Asia. And particularly do I wish you success in your effort to raise \$30,000,000 for the maintenance of the tens of thousands of Christians, and the other refugees and sufferers, wherever found in the Caucasus, in Persia, behind the British lines, or in the interior of Turkey."

THE RUSSIAN SITUATION.

Russia must be brought to know that true liberty puts upon itself right self-restraints. The real possessor of freedom is the one who makes a conscientious use of it, says Providence Journal. It is in the most highly developed form of society—where we might expect the least trammels—that the most trammels are self-imposed. Consciousness of power rouses in any right-thinking man the desire to employ it sparingly. It is the yellow-streaked mind that lends itself to selfish schemes of aggression. The bolsheviks are political parvenues. They have had no experience in governing themselves or anybody else. They are carried away with the idea that liberty is a gift from the gods, by virtue of which they may rule their unhappy neighbors with blood and iron. They are as crude and dangerous as a small boy with a buzz-saw. We can only hope that out of this tangle of theories, this welter of suffering, peace and order will eventually arise. Surely the insanity of the present lawless processes cannot go on forever. From where the helping hand, the guidance of experience and wisdom is to come, it is not yet possible to see. But somehow the hapless Russian people must and will be saved from their worse selves.

We have been warned against overconfidence, but when a man like Haig tells us the dark days are over, a reasonable and cheering optimism can be allowed. And this optimism ought to act on all as a spur to bring the bright days of victory nearer still by omitting no means of doing so.

The American people are asked to save six billions more than last year for the war. The sum is vast beyond the power of the mind to grasp—but divide it by 100,000,000. It is only \$60 each; more for some, less for others, according to their means and needs. It can be done.
