L. L. Subscription

Malheur county contributed \$474,000 to the grand total of \$58,362,000 of the Fourth Liberty Loan in Oregon. The number of subscribers in the county was 13,777 per cent. The over-subscription was 13.77 per cent. These figures have not been received from state headquarters. The official compilation do not show the quotas of non-banking centers.

In the newspapers outside of Portland \$7,534 column inches of space was used in paid and free publicity in aid of the loan. Following is a statement of the communities of this county:

Armenian Relief Fund

Drive Will Be Soon

Preparations are being made for a big drive for the Armenian relief work, beginning on February 17 and lasting one week. J. Boydell is chairman of the local committee and is getting his forces lined up for the big push. The following letters which he has received from the chairman of the state committee show that he is in touch with the state organization and will work in conjunction with them:

Portland, Or., Jan. 18, 1919.
Mr. J. Boydell, Chairman Armenian Relief Committee, Nyssa, Or.:

Thank you for your cordial telegram. Needless to say our committee is delighted at your prompt response. Supplies will be forwarded to you immediately. You will find neither receipt books nor pledge cards, and I wish you would at once send the estimate of what you will need, as we will have them all printed at the same time.

Things are happening quite fast in our campaign. On the second of this month we cabled Mr. Hoover and bought a carload of flour in the Mediterranean which cost us \$1,200.00 which was directed by wireless to proceed at once to Constantinople. The "Western Belle," a naval transport built in Portland, sailed from New York last week with 8750 tons of flour. Another transport furnished by the government is carrying 200 relief workers.

Locally, the State Food Administrator and the State Council of Defense have put all their resources at our disposal. Hoover cabled from France to the food administration that this should be done. They are writing letters to all their county representatives, urging them to get in line with our campaign and do everything possible to put it over. The food administrator has taken hold of our publicity, and every newspaper in the state will be lined up through this splendid machinery.

Every day brings letters and telegrams from different parts of the state assuring us that our old standby will be ready, February 17 to 24 I am hammering away at New York to give us a sufficient number of speakers to cover the state. You may be sure I will get everything I possibly can.

Several states have deliberately raised their quotas. Last year Clatsop county raised hers. I should like to telegraph New York and give our publicity department the news that your committee feels that \$540 assigned your district is not a measure of your generosity and that you are going after a certain percentage of increase. Do not fail to call on us for any assistance we can render.
