RECLAMATION BOOSTERS ARE CONFIDENT.

Although Congress adjourned without bringing to a vote the proposed legislation which, if enacted into law, would have made it possible for the department of the interior to begin work immediately on the construction of the Owyhee Project and other soldier settlements and provide work and homes for thousands of our returned soldiers, sailors and marines on reclaimed land, the fact that the bill was favorably reported in both the House and Senate, and the nation-wide approval of the plan as evidenced by the hundreds of letters received daily by the department, have led Secretary Lane to take the stand that there is every reason to believe that a similar bill will be favorably considered at the coming special session of Congress.

A memorandum for the press, furnished the Journal by the Department of the Interior, states that he is accordingly continuing the preliminary work of investigation as far as the limited funds at his disposal will permit, and also endeavoring to ascertain for the information of Congress the attitude toward the plan of as many men in the service as he is able to reach through the distribution of questionnaires at the various camps and naval stations throughout the country.

Secretary Lane is in thorough accord with Congressman Taylor of Colorado, the author of the bill introduced at the last session of Congress for putting the soldier-settlement plan into effect, who said:

"I can only say to the House and to the country, and to the many thousands of our splendid boys who will be sorely disappointed by this failure of the house to pass this bill or act upon this subject, that I will re-introduce the bill on the opening day of the next session of Congress and push the measure with

all the energy I possess, and I sincerely hope and believe that it will be enacted into law. And I also hope that instead of the appropriation being for \$100,000,000, it may be five times that amount; because even then we will not, in proportion to our wealth and resources, be doing nearly as much for our returning soldiers as is being done by Canada, Australia and all other English speaking countries. I am not only confident that this measure will be adopted, but I firmly believe it will go down in history as one of the great constructive policies of our country."

The Utah legislature which abolished the sale of cigarettes and made it an offense to even have the "makin's" in one's possession, was about as consistent as they would have been had they abolished beer and light wines and thus encouraged the use of forty rod whiskey. While cigarette smoking is undoubtedly injurious, it is the nicotine-reeking pipe that weakens the heart, hardens the arteries, causes a high blood pressure and sends so many men off to their final resting place long before they have reached their allotted three score years and ten.

The death of Mike O'Brien at an Ontario hospital Sunday removes another of the picturesque characters who subdued the desert and made Malheur county a land of plenty. Like many of the pioneers, he concealed a mine of sterling worth beneath a rugged exterior, as is evidenced by the universal regret at his passing.

Remember, a whole lot of agitation will be necessary before the Owyhee Project lands are watered. It's not enough for us to know that it's the best Project in the west; we must make the fellows who handle the funds know it, too.

In figuring up Nyssa's prospects for the future, don't overlook the fact that the Nyssa-Arcadia drainage system is reclaiming several hundred acres of valuable land right at our door.

That lazy, loafing feeling is not necessarily L. W. W.ism. It may be that spring is approaching in the Nyssa country.
